These men work at tasks which they do well, encourage in peace and prosperity of their labor, and work out their several duties in country and peace, a world in which governments, at their major contribution to the common welfare are highly and effectively working together in peace and prosperity, and to build all nations by the knowledge that any nation that is not a part of the world is not a part of the world.

The point in history at which we stand is full of promise and of danger. The world will either move toward unity and widely shared prosperity or it will move toward a world of competing economic blocs. We have a choice. We citizens of the United States, by our influence, have a choice of a more united and co-operating world. Whether we do so will determine the kind of lives our grandchildren will live.

Mr. Roosevelt said that in addition to the monetary fund and the world bank other proposals recently put forth by Secretary Acheson to Congress and will cover:

1. Establishment of a "free zone" and international organization of the United Nations.
2. Broadening and strengthening of the economic agreements set under which the President is authorized to negotiate tariff reductions with other countries.
3. An international agreement for the reduction of trade barriers. This is yet to be worked out but may be sought at a "round table" conference following that on internationalism.
4. Control of credit. With this Mr. Roosevelt included the "orderly marketing" of world production of certain commodities.
5. Revision of the Export-Import Bank. This is a new agency that would handle some of the American money in international trade.
6. The President may also set up a special agency to investigate and report on international trade.

WASHINGTON—A \$100,000,000 War Department civil loan bill was approved today by the House of Representatives.
