No Free Choice

Not too many North Carolina employers, for all the enlighterment that has been spreading around in the last few years, would cling to unemployment insurance if the compulsion for it were removed. The benefits of it are acknowledged. But the cost of it (starting at 3' of payrolis and scaling down only after a large reserve has been built up) is quite an item in most businesses.

Unemployment compensation was not the State's idea to begin with anyhow. The ready-made bill was rammed down the State's thout by the Federal Government's bilthe announcement that it was going to impace the tax, and if North Carolina wanted to pass the proper measure and set up the proper system, it could share in the proceeds. But the tax was going to be applied regardless, So said the Federals.

made several passes at taking over the whole system. The States' men in Congress have held them off so far, but the

gress have held them off so far, but the prevailing opinion, and it is a decided one, is that unless the States increase the benefits paid under uncomponent insurance and extend the coverage, the Pederals will be back sgain.

Hence, when you read that a bill has been introduced to the Legislature to Increase unemployment, compensation from \$3.00 to \$4.00 in week for 20 weeks instead of 16, and to take in all employers of one or more persons, instead of old, and to face in all comployers of one or more persons, instead of legist or more as at present, please do not look upon it as a sheer outburst of generosity on the part of the solons.
