OPA, never famous for its lact, recently hit a new low when officials threw three Congressmen out of a neeting of the Strawberry Conwers Industry Advisory Committee. Present at the meetings, besides the growers, were Representatives Jimmy Morrison of the Louisiana Lemocrat, and John Jennings Jr., Republican, both of Tennessee.

Gindick said he was referring to a ruling by the Attorney General, but Morrison innisted upon seeding the ruling or hearing it from the Attorney General eron of his staff. Finally Gindick gave up and called Mrs. Ethel Gilbert, head of the OPA Office of Industry Advistory Committee, after the Congressmen refused to go to Mrs. Gilbert's office.

"You gentiemen will have to leave," Mrs. Guibert told them. "The Attorney General dees not want Congressmen at industry advisory meetings."

Again Morrison insisted upon proof that the Attorney General had made such a ruling; to which Mrs. Gubert replied, "you are taking advantage of a lady, Mr. Morrison."
