Mrs. R. Keeps Busy

WASHINGTON—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt today was busy in organizing the task of re-

However worn from the shock surrounding her husband's expected death, Mrs. Roosevelt showed herself still possessed of her famous energy to get things done.

Before her husband's death last Thursday, Mrs. Roosevelt was planning to spend today at the Forest Glen Convalescent Center here for wounded servicemen.

Most of these probably will be placed in the library on the Roosevelt's Hyde Park estate which Mrs. Roosevelt bequeathed to the Government after the lifetime of his family.

On leaving Hyde Park Mrs. Roosevelt paused a moment at the train to thank each New York State cooperator who helped handle the throngs at the funeral.

Making the return trip with her daughter, Anna, and her father, Col. John Beutinger, hurried to find out how their five-year-old son, Johnny, is getting on.

In New York City Col. James Roosevelt, eldest of the four sons, boarded the Washington-bound train. It was the earliest moment he could reach his mother's side after a flight from Manila.

His and his three brothers have been military officers in the United States Army. Mrs. Roosevelt, the second son, flew in from England.

Franklin Delano Roosevelt Jr. and John Roosevelt were unable to return from their ships, somewhere in the Pacific.

'Career' Over Fala Stays With Cousin Of Late FR

RHINEBROOK, N. Y.—(AP)—Fala came here today the home of his original master—the four-year career as the President's favorite pup at an end.

Now his acts "like he wanted to get out and hunt rabbits, just like any other dog."

The words came from Miss Margaret Buckley, cousin of the late president Roosevelt, who gave Fala to the Chief Executive.

"The President said once that if anything ever happened to him he thought I should take care of Fala," she said. "So now he's going to live with me."

Fala is not in the home of a stranger. Twice he stayed with Miss Buckley when the President was away—Tehran and again at Yalta. Often he's been in her care on presidential trips.

Rhinebeck is a short drive up the Hudson Valley from the Roosevelt estate at Hyde Park. Fala spent yesterday afternoon playing with the two puppies he fathered about a month ago. Miss Buckley thought he seemed in better spirits.

"Fala has puzzled me lately," she said with genuine concern in her voice. "He has been very much depressed the last three days."
