It would deny the growing trend toward inter - denominational understanding and co-operation. This is a poor choice of weapons.

Better Late

No less than expected was President Truman's, exing of Attorney General Francis M. Biddle. The President prob-ably knew more about this inherited Cabinet member than he cared to dis-

He had learned a good deal about Biddle's methods of doing business from the days of the Truman Committee. Their trails had crossed once, skirled Their trails had crossed once, skirled against each other on another occasion. Both involved a number of the same factors, among which were (a) unmistakable wrongdoing by private concerns which (b) had employed Tommy ("The Cork") Corcoran as influenceman to get them out of trouble, and (c) fettlements by the Attorney General which were severely criticized as mysteriously lenient.

brain-fruster, one of the Happy Frankfurter, Biddle had been just a political
opportunist. Tommy brought him along,
got him his promotion from Solicitor
General to Attorney General. Whether
or not Franke repaid him at the expense of the Treasury, not to mention
the Justice he was entrusted to dispense, never was established. No Federal agency ever had the nerve to render a judgment on the two affairs.

But it was shown that Tommy op-erated from the office of the Attorney General himself, and it was specifically charged by an assistant attorney gen-eral that the settlement of one of the eral that the settlement of one of the cases was "completely dominated by Tommy Corcoran through his influence over Mr. Biddle," marking "the lowest point in the history of the Department of Justice since the Harding Administration."

President Roosevelt fired the outspoken assistant. President Truman has got around, we believe, to firing the right man.

The New & The Old

President Truman, shaking up his Cabinet, has stacked it with "liberals", according to the popular meaning of the word in Washington, And the three new members, Tom Clark as Attorney General, Lewis Schwellenhach as Secretary of Labor and Clinton Anderson as Secretary of Agricultur, got those "liberal" reputations as investigators, trust-busters and prosecutors. Each of them, as revealed in Drew Pearson's setches today, has shown a complete fearlessness of the great in looking after the affairs of government.

There was Tom Clark turning up war frauds, and handin, in important indictments of big lirms. There was Senator Schwelenbach, a fighting investigator of the early Rosseycit days, star-

ring in the investigation of lobbylists which put Howard Bopson behind bars. And there's New Mexico's Anderson, now to be charfed with control and production of food, subjects he knows well as an investigator. He's a man who stood against the big insurance companies in their anti-trust fight, though he is a successful insurance man himself. Wallace must be considered a new member, having scarcely settled down in Commerce. Stimson and Forrestal, in War and Navy, are wartime lixtures who will certainly remain. Bob Hannegan, as Postmaster General-Party Chairman, is also a new hand who will tide with the party.

Thus it becomes virtually a new Cabinet. Almost every communique coming out of San Francisco these days can be link-du up somehow with the sad case of Spain. When the big powers speak of regional, security, of the eights of in-dividual nations to combat aggression as it appears, it puts you fin mind of Spain in '36, when only Russia dared to intervene and fight the rising power of Germany and Italy in that stricken land.

You can test the Frisco plans prelly well by barking back to Spain, to wonder what effect they might have bad in that case. For there, in the time of the short-lived Republic, the world faced a situation it must face again and again. There, the good intentions of the great powers were put to test, and the democracies, cringing before the challenge, failed milerably to halt a world war. This week, thoughts must go back to Spain.

Mexico is ready to suggest that no government which came into existence through help of the Axis shall be allowed to join the world organization. limoga helj of the world organization.

And that, you see, would eliminate Spain. The scheme is almed directly at Pranco's regime. And at the moment Spanish Republicans are organizing a government-in-exite, to be ready for recognition. If the proposal gets into debate, there will be some furious sessions. Russia will back Moxico. The United States and Britain, if present signs are accurate, might oppose the plan. And the Russians will hold the biter knowledge that Franco never could have come into power except for the tact consent of Britain and the United States.

For Franco rose through cynical use of "non-intervention" by France and Britain. Even the help of Mussolini and Hitler might not have defeated the Re-Hitter might not have defeated the Republic had France not closed her borders to supplies for the government forces. It was the first time in history, Summer Welles recalls, that a legal government, resisting rebellion, had been deprived of the right to import arms for its own defense.
