Nips Caught Napping By Attacks On Both Flanks

Enemy Attacks But It's Too Late By RICHARD O'MALLEY GUAM - (AP) - Simultaneous American pre-dawn attacks on both flanks of the Japanese napping and apparently cracked the enemy's last ditch defense line on Okinawa, front dispatches reported today.

The Japanese came to life at dawn and attacked with machine-guns and heavy mortars. But it was too late.

Chirping Seventh Division Infantry held the eastern flank of the Japanese line. First Division Marines were astride a ridge at the western front, three miles away.

Fighting was fiercest in the hour starting at 5:30 a. m. of one hill, 147 men in a single Marine company, including all of its officers, were killed or wounded.

WOMAN IN CHARGE Japanese, including at least one woman in soldiers' uniform, charged the front lines during the night with lethal charges. They blew up the fire-trailers when they were in the rear.

U. S. infantrymen met scattered attacks with machine-guns and a brand new flame-thrower. Machine-guns were placed on the top of the escarpment on the backs of Yank scaling ropes.

Japs Fire Oil Tanks On Borneo Act As Aussie Troops Approach

By JAMES HUTCHESON BRUNEI BAY, Borneo - (AP) - The Japanese fired west Borneo's first aerial oil field storage tanks last night - even as Allied forces did before the Japanese captured this island with its vast stores of oil early in the war.

Hundreds of thousands of gallons must have been destroyed last night, it is estimated. It is estimated that a 12-foot tank which would hold a million gallons of oil was destroyed.

There is no word of connection between the two areas, but the Japanese apparently are taking to themselves the credit of having destroyed the tanks by air.

It is taken for granted that the Japanese will destroy the tanks with their own planes, but it is not clear whether they will use their own planes or those of the United States.

Previously, Seventh Fleet PT boats had reported some Japs were taking to the water in the area of the oil tanks.

Many Japanese troops were killed when they tried to escape from the island, it is reported.

Tiny Nations Irate Big Powers Win Battle Over Veto

By JOHN M. HIGHTOWER Associated Press Diplomatic News Editor SAN FRANCISCO - (AP) - Defeat of an Australian amendment cleared the way today for approval in a United Nations Conference Committee of the Big Five demand for total control of proposed machinery for world security.

The amendment, which would have removed the veto from steps to settle international disputes peacefully and limited it to use of force, was voted down 22 to 15.

Small nations, whose split over the veto issue, were bitterly disappointed that the United States and the Soviet Union would not support the amendment.

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Agreement On Parley Announced By Truman

Time And Place Remain Secret By ERNEST B. VACCARO WASHINGTON - (AP) - President Truman today reported complete agreement on a "Big Three" meeting soon, a gratifying improvement in Russian relations, and said he hoped the Polish issue is on the way toward settlement.

The Chief Executive told a news conference that he and Marshall Stalin and a member of Churchill have fixed a definite time and place for a conference, but said these details will be withheld until he arrives at the designated spot.

ELECTION HOPE Asserting that Stalin is just as anxious to get along with the United States as we are to get along with the Russians, the President expressed confidence in an early free and democratic election in Poland.

Mr. Truman credited Harry Hopkins, his recent emissary to Moscow, with a major role in the "Big Five" veto position at San Francisco, as well as a growing willingness to work out other differences.

The President authorized this quotation in a prepared statement issued today by the White House, which followed a breakfast meeting with Hopkins and Davies.

Obviously somewhat concerned about questions by reporters who raised the question of possible inability to get support from London, the President asked that Americans refrain from muddying the waters.
