Ancient Shadow

North Carolina's Grand Jury system came in when he opened court in Mecklenburg this week. Ranged before him are the 18 Grand Jurors, probably impressed by the occasion and their unsought part in making the wheels of justice go around.

"In eighteen years on the bench," said the Judge, "this Court has not had a material change come before it by way of amendment through Grand Jury in a single instance."

The State's constitution was adopted in 1868. Despite its questionable antecedents, it has been a pretty fair constitution as such documents go.

During Governor Gardner's administration a Constitutional Commission was appointed to study the constitution and suggest advisable changes or a re-draft.

Because of other controversial provisions—notably those relating to the attitude in local taxation and in giving the Governor the veto power—this proposed constitution was never submitted by the Legislature.

Still, the Judge drew a half-hour's satisfaction out of his post with the ancient shadow, and we ourselves got a nice long editorial from the proceedings. That is something to be said for the Grand Jury system.

It was a familiar scene of the anti-Communist staff the Catholics was spouting in the last days of the treaty, but it didn't carry the slick German stamp.

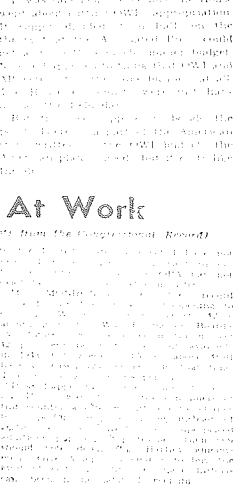
