### **The Ballot Is Also Confused**

WE remarked the other day upon the strange spectacle of Southern Democrats in general, and North Carolina Democrats in particular, shying away from a formal coalition with the Republican Party even though they are consistently following the O. O. P. line in Councess. The Hendersonville Times-News finds our reasoning confused.

It is quite true. The Times-News conat the national Democratic Party cedes, that the national Democratic Party and the Southern Democrats are no longer headed in the same direction. But it is not the Southerners who have deserted the Party, it is the Party which has deserted the Southerners.

We disagree with the conclusion of The Charlotte News in this particular—"then bolting his party is an act of statesmanship, not of political treason"—the point was make being that the so-called Democratic party is the boiler in this case, not North Carolina Senators and Congressmen.

The matter of who's out of step—the great majority of the country's Democrats or a handful of conservative Southerners—strikes us as self-evident. We were not arguing against the conservatism of the Southern Democrats in our original editorial, nor are we now. But we do question the ethical principles of any Congressman who accepts the benefits conferred upon the members of a Congressional majority, and at the same time sabotages his own

Party's legislative program. Such action is as dangerous as it is hypocritical, for it threatens the entire structure of party government.

Moreover, The Times-News is guilty of historical confusion when it argues that Southerners are the only consistent Demorats. The course charted by Franklin Roosevelt was not a break with Party tradition, but a return to the principles of Andrew Jackson. The wounded cries of the business community in the face of New Deal reforms were as nothing compared to the screams of property-owners in the days when Andrew Jackson and Martin Van Buren were campaigning against the United States Bank. The first labor unions in this country were organized during Jackson's administration, and were defended violently by the Democratic Party, And even back there in the 1830's many conservative Southerners, who had originally joined the Democratic Party, broke with what John C. Calhoun called "the radical party of Jackson" Before the end of Jackson's second term the Democratic Party was acknowledged as the "common man's party" and recarded with loathing by the gentry. We are all for Congressmen. Southern or
otherwise, voting according to their conviction, and we concede that most of them
are doing so now. But we'd also like to
have that privilege extended to all North
Carolinians, including our conservative
contemporary in Hendersonville. The
Times-News. we hope, will agree that there
is something gravely wrong with a political
system that forces the voter to support a
conservative Congressman and a liberal
Administration on one and the same ballot.

### Generals Can Be Great Democrats

"T strikes me as a shameful thing," wrote Senator Balley to one of his constituents, "that in the hour of victory there are so many Americans who refer to four admirals and generals) as "brass hats." There may be among them an occasional fool, weaking or rascal, the Senator concedes, "but taken all in all there is not a nobler body of men on earth than the men who led this country to victory."

Noble is rather a lavish word, but we Noble is rather a lavish word, but we find ourselves in general agreement with the Senator. Certainly the generals and admirals, who have just won the greatest victory in our history deserve something better than the barrage of dead cats now being hurled at them. As the argument over universal military training, grows hotter, professional military men are accused of everything from gross inefficiency to fascism, and it is charged that turning the nation's youth over to them for a year is a certain method of undermining American democracy.

Of course universal military training will imperil democracy: we doubt seriously if free institutions can lone survive in an armed camp. But there is a sort of child-ish confusion of cause and effect behind the charge that the officers of the regular architecture. establishment are consciously working for the creation of a fascist state.

If the military system were as intrinsically evil as its critics believe, it stands to reason that the men who succeed under it would be howling reactionaries. Yet, with the possible expection of Generals Marchiur and Pation, the military leaders the average citizen can name offhand—Generals Marshall, Eisenhower, Stillweil and Bradley and Admirals Nimitz and Halsey—are prototypes of democracy.

It is not insignificant that one of the It is not insignificant that one of the few caim, dispassionate voices raised in the midst of the current Red scare belongs to the Chief of Staff of the Army, General Essenhower, who said: "We have nothing to gain to start with, and would have noth-ing left when it is over." And General Marshall, a great soldier recently con-wried into a great diplomat. has become the white hope of democracy's survival in Asia.


