And the Sheriff replied, "What jail break?" He went into explanations hurriedly when the reporter moved for the door saying, "That's all I want to know."

The alter case the Sheriff proclaimed that his jailers had been alerted, and the

guard would be closer. He intimated that there would be no more escapes. But they continue, somehow. It has become clear that the posting of the guard is informal, and that jailers are not so cautious as they might be. We don't see how the Sheriff can escape responsibility for what goes on in—and out of—his jail.

In these times the duties of this functionary are sharply limited. He has become little more than a bearer of summons and a keeper of the goal. And when the traffic in and out of his cells becomes so heavy that they are more like flop houses than prison cubicles, the electorate should become curious.

We have no intention of campaigning

should become curious. We have no intention of campaigning against Sheriff Riley, nor of boosting either of his challengers. But it appears to us that, regardless of the forthcoming elections, it is an important next of the Sheriff's responsibility to see to it that his prisoners spend the prescribed time to his keeping. Otherwise, it seems, the voter must conclude that the incumbent has been neglecting his affairs.
