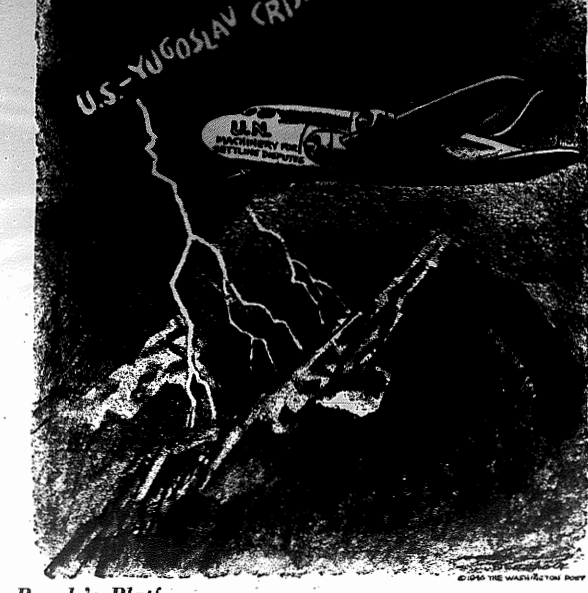


What Goes Up Must Come Down
