CAB Report Made Public

Plane's Flip-Over Caused By Pilot's 'Experimenting'

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Civil Aeronautics Board said today that use in flight of a device locking the control surfaces caused an American Airlines plane with 58 persons aboard to flip over on its back and go into a near-fatal dive over Mr. Riley, W. M. on Oct. 11.
