Their forecast for '4' was oft on all major points. They looked for a drop in farm prices, a decline in factory output, a slump in exports of farm crops. Wholesale prices were expected to go no higher than the level of August 1946 and it was believed that consumer demand for industrial goods would be satisfied except in motor cars and housing. Employment and incomes we re expected to fail. In other words, we were to have a mild recession, Remember?

These factors continue to operate to an extent which makes it easy for our economists to predict there will be no letdown before mid-1948, if then. Exports will stay high under the aid-to-Europe program. There is no chane for American industry, already producing at near capacity, to catch up. Farmers cannot fill the demand for their products in any of the major lines except tobacco. Labor unions are demanding a third round of wage hikes. Prices have no way to go except up. Profits now are at the ail-time peak. Retail trade volume is the highest in history and will rise above \$100 billion for 1947.
