Rome And Four Other Countries Sign Pacts

PARIS — (AP) — Italy and four other nations today signed peace treaties with the Allies which shear all of treasure and armed power and take territory from all except Bulgaria.

Woman Married Gems For Durant

WASHINGTON — (AP) — His pretty, curly-haired former secretary testified today that she married part of the \$1,500,000 Hessian crown jewels for Col. Jack W. Durant from Europe to the United States under diplomatic immunity.

Mrs. Martha Evans nervously told the military court she brought a box of jeweled brooches, pins and bracelets, and a pearl necklace across the Atlantic for the 37-year-old officer now on trial for the jewels.

The smartly-dressed young woman, identified items from the fabulous Hessian collection as she brought them over. Mrs. Evans testified she received part of the jewels from Col. Durant in February, 1946 in a London hotel. She then was serving on the United Nations orphans' package service.

On Durant's instructions, she said she brought the valuables across the Atlantic and later turned them over to the colonel at a luncheon meeting in Alexandria, Va.

In a trembling voice, Mrs. Evans testified that Durant displayed at that time a "real diamond." She said she told him she was afraid of "getting into trouble," and Durant told her to "get into it now."

On another occasion, Mrs. Evans testified she received a package from Durant with a letter instructing her to turn over the package to James E. Durant, Falls Church, Va., brother of the colonel and a German accountant.

The trial was recessed at noon Monday and Wednesday when Mrs. Evans will resume her testimony.

No explanation was given for the delay, but the outlay had overruled a defense motion for a two-day continuance on grounds that the witness, 77, had been called for a minor operation yesterday on her foot.

Chinese Troops Move Near Dairen

PEIPING — (AP) — Unconfirmed Chinese press dispatches today said that Government troops have moved to within 100 miles of Soviet-controlled Dairen, Manchuria. For months the Chinese troops have waited at Pulantan, 65 miles to the northeast.

The move under the 1945 Sino-Soviet treaty was to become a Chinese province. The Chinese have remained there since Japanese forces there surrendered.

Government units meanwhile fought Chinese Communist armies in control of China's pipelines, North-South railways, the Tientsin-Peking and Peiping-Hankow lines. Chinese Communist said the Government bombed the city of Tientsin, a gateway to the Tientsin-Peking route, and Government reports indicated an imminent campaign against Communist blocking Peiping-Hankow traffic.

Three Rare Paintings Declared Permanent Government Property

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A rare self-portrait by the famous Dutch painter Rembrandt and two German-owned paintings, which were successively stolen from the museum on April 28, today were declared the permanent property of the United States.

Ownership of the paintings now on display at the Dayton, Ohio Art Institute was formally "vested" in the Government by Attorney General Clark. All were seized at Dayton in 1945.

LONDON — (AP) — The gravest fuel famine in British history closed down more than 4,000,000 workers into idleness and restoring the wholesale dole.
