THE Senate's confirmation of the Truman Doctrine in Greece and Turkey by a non-partisan voice of 67 to 23 is being hailed as definite proof of American unity. Octainly the majority is an impressive one under the circumstances. Absolute unity is impossible in a nation in which speech is free and opinions and interest diverse, and there have been few occasions, in peacetime at least, when the Senate has shown less division on major matters of foreign policy, Lend-Lease, for instance, carried by a vote of 60 to 31; the Hull Reciprocal Trade Agreements by 42 to 37; repeal of the arms embargo by 60 to 33.

can afford to lend financial aid and support to any foreign nation under any circumstances. Senator Pepper, on the other
hand, is a New Dealer who has never displayed the slightest fear of a deficit, he
does not accept the theory that communiman deaptislism are unalterably opposed
and therefore sees no reason why current
differences can't be resolved through the
United Nations.

These are, perhaps, extreme opinions of

the right and left. And yet who can say that there is not merit in each of them? Did the United States Government really exhaust all possibilities of co-operative action through UN before it lecided to embark upon a course of unitateral action designed to contain Soviet Russian 2 Did the gentleppen who cast their voles for the Truman Doctore the potential cost of maintaining II, and the possible effect on the American economy? There was little sign of solemn deliberation on these major points in the Senatorial debate. The impression we got was that the leaders of both Parties had satisfied themselves that co-operation with Russfa is impossible and that rank-and-file Democrats and Republicans accepted that verdict without question. There was even a feeling that any Senator who dared speak out in opposition was cultive of something close to treason All of which, we suppose, is the natural fruit of a bi-partisan foreign policy.

Inclined as we are to accept the Doctrine as an unpleasant necessity, we nevertheless find in the Senate's voting record a disturbing reminder that there are a good many things we don't know about it. The dissenters represented no minority united firmly in support of some such ideology as isolationism; they were instead a group of politicians and/or statesmen who looked upon the Truman Doctrine from independent and even conflicting viewpoints and found that they could not support it. This, it seems to us, at least raises a outstion as to whether the appearance of national unity is not in fact an illusion.

The Senate vote alone cannot make the Doctrine an effective instrument of international policy. That cannot come until a sizeable majority of the American people understand it, accept it, and express their willingness to sacrifice to maintain it. So far as we can see that fundamental condition still has not been met.

This takes him into an area where the closed mind usually pays off, and sooner or later he finds himself in the doubtful company of those who are determined to earry a point at any cost, which is, of course, an illiberal attitude.

It is not surprising, therefore, that 87 of It is not surprising, therefore, that \$7\$ of the country's leading liberals — including Frank Graham and Howard Odum of the University of North Carolina—have found it necessary to issue a manifesto declaring their opposition to Communism and all its works. The failure to distinguish between pro-Communism and "a desire for friendly relations between America and Russia", the contraction of the communication they insist, "occasions the grave present-day plight of the liberal-progressive cause." This serves to further emphasize the cleavage in liberal ranks first made evident by the simultaneous formation of the Progressive Citizens of America and the Americans for Democratic Action. PCA, for which Henry Wallace is a leading spokesman, does not reject Communist support, while ADA does.

But it also serves to emphasize the true nature of the liberals' problem. It is not the liberals who have falled to make a proper distinction between those who are pro-Communist and those who are only trying, within the limits of traditional American methods, to improve relations between Russia and the United States. That failure Russia and the United States. That failure must be charged to the general public. The prevailing attitude of the American people, its seems to us, leaves no room for fine distinctions of any sort. As a matter of fact it hardly leaves room for honest disagreement on any matter involving not only Communist Russia, but labor unions and civil liberties. Simply disavowing connectivity will not restore the liberal's effectiveness, for he will be dammed if he only stands up for the right of Communists to be heard.

This attitude, we hope, is a natural product of the tense time in which we live. It that is so it will pass, as it has before But until-it does the liberal may as well resign himself to political impotence. This just len't his inning.

It Happens In The Best Of Brackets

A n income tax operpayment of \$52,989 would be newsworthy in any event. When such payment is made by a man who was a ranking authority on tax matters in priyate life, and Undersecretary of the Treasury in public life, it certainly belongs in the man-bites-dog class,

It is probable that Max Gardner, being the sort of man he was and being somewhat on the spot because of his official position, gave the Government full benefit of every doubt. Even so it is difficult to see how he could have leaned over backward to the tune of \$52,989.

The answer must be that Max Gardner, like all the rest of us, got lost somewhere between subparagraph 65 and line 217 (a). Even with his vast legal experience—and his Washington law firm had handled some of the trickiest corporate tax deals in history—be simply couldn't make his income tax computations come out even.

It is a fine posthumous compliment to fax Gardner that he erred on the side of the Government. But it was, nevertheless, it error, and under the circumstances it
