## Letter From Former U.S. Officials Disclosed

### Says Aid Pledged To Ex-Premier

**BUDAPEST (AP)—** A leading Hungarian Communist said today that a letter had been found from Dean Acheson, former U. S. Under Secretary of State, "promising support" to former Premier Ferenc Nagy, whom the Communists have accused of plotting to overthrow the republic.

Josef Reval, Communist member of Parliament, writing in the Communist newspaper Szabados, said also that Nagy had sent a letter to Acheson in January concerning the "Truman Doctrine." This, he added, "was several months before the Truman Doctrine was promulgated to be labeled as an anti-Communist policy."
