OTTAWA — (AP) — President Truman said today the United States intends to help those nations that want to live in peace with their neighbors, without coercion or intimidation.
He also promised that American resources will be used to measure world recovery by aiding those who are willing to make the "maximum contribution to the same cause."

Just To Be Sociable' Iowan Gives Molotov A Ring On Phone Line To Moscow

OLWEIN, Ia. — (AP) — M. E. Schreder, 20-year-old railroad fireman, told today how he put through a long distance call to Russian Foreign Minister Molotov in Moscow "just to be sociable."
"It was the best \$2.50 (plus tax) I ever spent," Schreder said, recounting the conversation which took place Sunday.
"I was home in Olwein, Iowa, and I was on the phone line to Moscow," Schreder said. "I was talking about railroadings and things like that."
Schreder said he reached Molotov at the Kremlin after a four and a half hour wait.

Chinese Charge Invasion Blame Placed On Russia

NANKING — (AP) — A Chinese Government spokesman declaring "this is no ordinary frontier incident," charged Russia today with partial responsibility for an Outer Mongolian invasion of China's remote Sinkiang Province.
The Government instructed its Ambassador in Moscow to protest the incident to both the Soviet Government and to the Outer Mongolian Minister there as the aftermath of a punitive campaign which carried a Mongol cavalry battalion into Sinkiang.
Chang Yuen-chang, Foreign Office spokesman, gave no reason for Moscow's refusal to increase to Moscow and declined comment on other warplanes with Soviet markings had supported the Mongol attack, as reported by the official Central News Agency. Outer Mongolia, however, is Pro-Soviet.

Russia Gets Strong Note On Upset At Budapest

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The United States today sent Russia a strong protest against the Soviet upset of Hungary's Government.

Free Sugar Sale Near

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Prospects for an end to household sugar rationing are brightened today as the United States was allotted a larger share of the world sugar pool.
The International Emergency Food Council, inter-governmental agency which divides scarce foods among importing areas, granted today this year's allotment for the United States of 350,000 tons more than originally had been allotted for this year.
This increase is equivalent to about five pounds a person, a highly placed Agriculture Department official, who asked that he not be named, said the additional supply would be enough to permit rationing to householders, if not to institutions and to industrial plants, to be dropped by the end of this month.
The new allotment is available for the last half of the year should be sufficient to allow consumption including rationing to be at a pre-war rate of nearly 100 pounds a person.

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Bill Lowering Age For Enlistments Approved

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Legislation lowering the Army's voluntary enlistment age to 17 was approved today by the House Armed Services Committee.
The measure also permits reenlistments for terms up to six years and original enlistments for two, three, four, five or six years, at the option of the recruit.
The bill also provides for the enlistment of 17-year-olds who are not yet 18 at the end of each year of the indefinite period.

Reds Offer Atom Plans

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y. — (AP) — A new set of atomic proposals which left the Soviet position on the veto in the United Nations unchanged, the United States today opened a possibility of agreement over international control of atomic energy.
Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko, speaking before the United Nations Security Council after a widely-publicized request for a special meeting, called for a new set of proposals for international control over all facilities engaged in mining and production of atomic energy.
However, he stipulated that the proposals be within the framework of the Security Council, which Russia and the other four big powers hold the power to veto. Further, he said the proposed body would make recommendations to the Security Council on measures for prevention and suppression in respect to "violators."
