THE President's special commission on Universal Military Training prefaced its report with this statement: "Universal Military Training pare faced its report with this statement: "Universal Military Training has no proper place in Americafi life except to the extent that national security and our world obligations demand it." There is further evidence that the commission looked upon DNAT with some "reluctance in the fact that it rejucted the War and Navy Department's blueprint and brought forwärd-a plan of its own-calling for a higher degree of civilian control. But the commission did find, after reviewing all the evidence at its disposal, that "national, security and our world obligations" now demand as clean break with American tradition.

American tradition.

The members of the commission are not militarists, nor are they citizens who might be panicked easily by an ideological bugaboo. They do not believe—as buffer lour of military service would be a fine and healthy thing for a growing boy. They have soberly weighed the current American position in the world, and the threat posed by Soviet Russia, and concluded that full military preparedness (of which UMT is an essential part) is in order.

essential part) is in order.

If the commission's (and the Administration's) analysis of the current international situation is correct, there is no valid argument against UMT. To object to its adoption would be like objecting to an expansion of the fire department when the roof its already smoking. But it seems to us that UMT cannot be offered to the people in the somewhat casual manner Mr. Truman has employed thus far with any reasonable expectation of acceptance.

It is time—past time — for a full and frank discussion of the Truman Doctrine and all those changes in American policy necessary to implement it. THE police have a variety of rough-and-rendy classifications for the ir alco-holic customers: fighting drunk, shouting drunk, falling-down drunk, and passed out. A fighting or shouting drunk will ownerally be charged with assault and bat-tery or disturbing the peace — drunkenes, if it is mentioned at all being incidental to the more serious count Only those in the last two categories are charged with simple drunkenness.

The police are naturally reluctant to arrest a falling-down drunk or a passed-out drunk if he is doing no particular damage. If he is at home or among friends damage. If he is at home or among friends he will not be disturbed unless a formal complaint is lodged against him, and this is rare. Those who are listed on police blotters as plain drunk are, nine times out of ten, citizens who have fallen saleep in a public place or who have been sightled by a patrolman weaving out of control, along a public thoroughfare Even in these cases, an often on the price of the pro-cesses, and the control of the control of the will, usually avert a trip to the station.

So the plain drunk who finds his way to jail is an extreme case — friendless and completely soused. Yet an average of about one out of twelve of Charlotte's citizens finds himself in this category once each year. Would we improve our drunkenness record by voting in ABC stores? Certainly there wouldn't be any miraculous, overnight improvement, and perhaps there wouldn't be any improvement at all. But it is hard to see how strictly-regulated State stores could result in any increase in a drunkenness rate that is already higher than that of any ABC county, and also higher than that of most cities where open bars flourish behind noon signs. To argue that an increase would follow legalization of our goromous lillicit liquor traffic is to argue that Mecklenburg produces a social hered of citiven far more asseptible to strong drink than the average American.

American.

These figures make it clear that prohibition has been an abject failure in Charlotte: If it has prevented any citizen (including those minors who would be barred from ABC stores) from obtaining a drink when and where he wanted it the court records show no evidence of it. It would be a wonderful thing if the yoters could go to the polls a week from Saturday and decide whethen Mecklenburg is to have liquor or not. Unhapplity their only choice is, as it always has been, between likeai liquor and leral liquor, between an uncontrolled bootlety trade and a system of open sales by a responsible public agency.
