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War-Time Secret Revealing Feared

WASHINGTON (AP)—A top Congressional spy-hunter said today many persons suspected of espionage may never come to trial because of the danger of exposing secrets still closely kept.

Discussing this possibility, Rep. McDowell (R-Pa.), acting chairman of the House Un-American Activities Committee, told reporters a "fundamental change" in American court processes may be necessary.

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Middle East U. N. Bloc Shaping Up

PARIS (AP)—A new bloc of twelve Middle Eastern nations, which might radically alter the voting line-up of the United Nations, was reported in process of formation today in the Palais de Chaillot.

Foreign Ministers and chief delegates of 12 of the nations concerned have scheduled a meeting for tomorrow.

All twelve nations have shown some wavering anti-Soviet sentiment and they all stand in the shadow of the Russian bloc.

The member countries occupy adjoining parts of three continents: Europe, Africa and Asia.

Observers noted that these twelve nations, in combination with twenty-two nations of the United States American bloc, could form a solid voting majority.

Red Denies America Has Atom Bomb Monopoly

PARIS (AP)—Russia accused the United States today of seeking war aid and said the Americans have no monopoly on the atom bomb.

In a violent attack on U. S. atomic policy, Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei V. Vishinsky told the 86-member United Nations political committee that the United States is pursuing "war aims."

He added that "it is a mistake to believe that one nation has a monopoly on atomic energy. That is a dangerous miscalculation."
