Bureau, a co-operative enterprise sponsored
by the Community Council of Chariotte and

established social agencies of the city.

might be spread as widely and as fairly as
possible. The Bureau does not interfere
with the established Yuletide programs of
individuals and organizations, but simply
asks that they co-operate by resistating in individuals and organizations, but simply asks that they co-perate by registering in the Bureau's confidential files the names of the families they intend to help. Then the Bureau assumes responsibility for all those who are left.
