Byrd Urges Caution In Dixie Revolt Against Party

Tells South To Hold Fire But Keep Powder Dry

House Members Adopt Resolution

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senator Byrd of Virginia gave the Democratic Party's Dixie rebels this advice.

Hold your fire—but keep your powder dry.

Byrd told a party gathering at Richmond, Va., Friday night that the South won't stand for laws setting up a Fair Employment Practices (no race or color line) Commission, making lynching a Federal crime and banning poll taxes and race separation.

"We must make a calm, deliberate decision, on the basis of events that happen and be prepared to go through with it to the end," he said.

Truman Arrives In Puerto Rico

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP)—President Truman told the people of Puerto Rico today that the appointment of an island-born governor was just a step toward an "increasing measure of self-government."

He greeted Gov. Jesus T. Piñero, his own appointee, and other islanders at San Juan's El Morro hotel.

"Freedom is a word which is found in every language. Equality is a word which is not found in any language."

He described the relationship between the United States and Puerto Rico as an example of "mutual cooperation between friendly people."

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One-Month Rent Curbs Agreed On

Extension Of Law To Be Asked

WASHINGTON (AP)—A 30-day extension of rent controls was agreed on today by Senate and House Republican leaders.

Senator Taft (R-Ohio) told reporters the Senate will be asked to extend the law for a 30-day extension but the House is expected to pass the measure by the late 11th.

The extension would allow both chambers time to decide whether to continue controls for long low and in what form. The Senate now is debating the bill to continue controls 14 months with some changes from the present law.

Chairman Taft (R-NJ) said his House Banking Committee will act on the bill by the end of the month.

Because of this, Taft said it will be necessary for the Senate to act on the 30-day extension, proposed by the House, by the late 11th.

Taft said, however, that the Senate will go ahead with the long-range bill and the final report will be made by the end of the month.
