Vow To Use Weapons Against Both Sides

Large-Scale Fight Seems Underway

JERUSALEM (AP)—British troops halted beside Jews today against Arab snipers dug in on hillsides commanding the Jerusalem-Jaffa road, a Jewish Agency source said.

The British vowed last night to use their weapons henceforth "impartially against whichever side is firing."

The informant said both British police and troops moved into the area about 12 miles outside Jerusalem.

A large-scale battle appeared to be under way. Heavy automatic weapons and gr. were heard, and the Jews were believed to be bringing up mortars.

The British have threatened to use weapons more powerful than those now available, either to Jews or Arabs to stem the blood fighting which has raged in Jerusalem since the United Nations decision to partition the Holy Land was announced in November.

The new battle is near a point where the Jerusalem-Jaffa road leaves the Jewish hills and enters the narrow strip of land which the road has been impossible for weeks.

Protracted fighting between Arabs and Jews within Jerusalem, makes life intolerable for its inhabitants. "It is impossible for Jews to remain in the area," said a British official.

The British commander of the Jerusalem force must be using impartially against both Arabs and Jews.

The Government's charge all but severed relations with the Jewish Agency, which is a representative of the Palestine's 700,000 Jews.

The Government's statement to the House of Commons, apparently stemmed from the blowing up of a Jewish transport truck which 28 British soldiers were killed. The Stern Group, Jewish underground group, claims it blew up the truck.

The Government said continuance of "indiscriminate murder and condoned terrorism can only lead to forfeiture of all rights in the eyes of the world."

Haganah, the Jewish militia, replied in a broadcast to the State Department, charging that its primary purpose is to confuse the issue among "particularists at Lake Success."

It said it is "righteous moralizing does not change the facts," said Haganah. "Most people in the world realize that the British attitude toward the Jewish people is a disgrace."

NASHVILLE, Tenn.—(AP)—Gov. Jim McCall today commuted to 99 years imprisonment the death sentence of Daniel Budzynski, who was scheduled to die in the electric chair Thursday.

The commutation was granted after a twenty-year-old Methodist Sunday School teacher from Pittsburgh asked for clemency for her girlfriend's heart.

Steel Price Probe

Taft Fears New Wage Demands

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senator Taft (R-Ohio) expressed fear today that the recent steel price increase might touch off new demands for wage boosts.

He said he is concerned that "one of the fundamental and tried and true ways of increasing wages is by increasing productivity."

The Bethlehem steel industry has been the target of a steel price increase. "I don't think a third round will increase it justified."

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Two Women Accuse Cabby's Double Life

ST. LOUIS, Mo.—(AP)—Two women testified today for the first time in three years a professional taxi driver led a double life, living with one in the daytime and with the other at night.

Monroe P. Adams, 30, was indicted Tuesday on charges of trial next week after Magistrate D. B. Price found probable cause to charge of bigamy at a hearing.

The Governor said his action did not affect Budzynski's companion, Richard Reilly, 21, also of Pittsburgh, who is scheduled to die in the electric chair at the State Penitentiary at dawn Thursday.

Reilly was identified as the trial of the two youths as the trigger-man in the hold-up involving a Memphis pawnbroker and clothes dealer.

Jeanne said she applied for a marriage license immediately after the trial.

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Records On Dr. Condon Subpoenaed

Thomas Sends For Loyalty Files

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Commerce Department's loyalty board files concerning Dr. Edward U. Condon were ordered subpoenaed today by Chairman Thomas (R-NJ) of the House Un-American Activities Committee.

Condon, 66-year-old scientist and head of the Government's Bureau of Standards, was accused by a House group of being "one of the weakest links in our atomic security."

He was also accused of the group, headed by Thomas, of associating with Communist agents.

As Thomas acted to obtain records on the case, the Atomic Energy Commission told a Senate-Home committee that Condon has no access to top atomic secrets.

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Won't 'Speculate' Vandenberg Dodges Candidacy Question

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) declined today to "speculate" whether he would accept a republican nomination for President.

Vandenberg, who Raymond A. McConnell Jr. of Lincoln, Neb., newspaper editor again, asking that his name be withheld from the April 13 Nebraska primary.

McConnell had held up filing of a petition to include Vandenberg's name on the Nebraska ballot until the Michigan Senator had opportunity to answer this question.

If you were nominated by the Republican convention would you accept the nomination? "I would not speculate on that," Vandenberg said.

"I have heretofore made my position clear. I shall not discuss it further. I request that my name be not filed for a position for which I am not a candidate."

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Civil Rights Act Nears Showdown On Floor

WASHINGTON (AP)—A 11-lynching legislation moved one step further toward passage in Congress today, and a Southern Democrat shouted in the House that Harry Truman is a dead

lyncher. The House Judiciary Committee approved the anti-lynching legislation. What word of its action circulated, Rep. Ripers of South Carolina got up in the House and told Republicans they were making a mistake by pushing the President's civil rights legislation.

"I tell you, you are shooting at a dead bird. Harry Truman is a dead bird already."

The action seemed the bill—a key part of President Truman's civil rights program—just one step short of the House floor. It must be cleared by the Senate before the House can vote on it. It is one of the measures which has Southern Democrats opposing it.

The Judiciary committee voted behind closed doors and the vote was not announced officially. However, the House Rules Committee, which the bill was referred to, said the bill was cleared by the committee.

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Soviet Moves Resented

OSLO, NORWAY (AP)—A wave of anti-Soviet sentiment swept Scandinavia today as resentment mounted against the Communist coup in Czechoslovakia and Russian pressure in Finland.

In Norway, Denmark and Sweden the feeling manifested itself in mass demonstrations and press attacks on the Soviet government.

In Oslo, thousands of students demonstrated last night outside the Czechoslovak Legation. Later they marched to the "People's House," where a Communist rally was being held.

In Denmark, pro-Russian agitation has been reported in the press. "Danger is closing in on Scandinavia," said the conservative Nationalist.

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Passes Wallace Dewey Pushes Eisenhower

Harry F. Byrd of Virginia, climbed to sixth place, ahead of Republican Harold Stassen. General Eisenhower retained his lead in the standings, but Governor Dewey gained support, passed Henry Wallace and took over second place, with a good chance to take over the leadership.
