We are being realistic for a moment at the suggestion of Congressman W. J. Bryan Dorn and other "hot war" types of talk of national defense and wants "a policy of national offense." No, because the one who would have an ally left in the lands which we led to another slaughter, and which we would be forced to occupy and pacify?

Housing Is The Big Issue

WASHINGTON politicians have received many indications that decent housing for Americans is the main issue of the mass of voters, of even more concern than the high prices and the "hired of" status of the Marshall Plan for European Recovery.
