## Mother And Daughter Shot To Death In Mount Airy

### Barber Held On Charges Of Murder Of Murder In Killings

**Shooting Ends Long Discussion**

**MOUNT AIRY** —(AP)—Mrs. Blanche Roper, 35, and her daughter, Arlene, 18, were shot to death about 9 P. M. yesterday in what officers said was the aftermath of a quarrel between Mrs. Roper and a Mount Airy barber, Lonnie A. Jordan.

Police are holding Jordan on a charge of murder in connection with the slaying of Mrs. Roper and her daughter. He is being held for a hearing in the morning.

According to the story told by Mrs. Roper's surviving daughter, Margaret, 16, the shooting occurred after a day-long discussion between Mrs. Roper and Jordan over whether they should stop "going together."

Mrs. Roper, reportedly separated from her husband, had been keeping company with Jordan for the past year, according to the story told by the daughter.

The shooting occurred at the Roper home on Pipe St. in the northwest section of Mount Airy. Mrs. Roper was shot in the chest and Arlene in the back.

### 'Not Very Remote'

### Third World War Calamity Possibility

**WASHINGTON** —(AP)—Chairman Eaton (R-NJ) of the House Foreign Affairs Committee said today the possibility of a Third World War "is not very remote."

Eaton was asking the House Rules Committee to send to the House for quick legislation for \$20,000,000 worth of economic and military aid to Western Europe, China, Greece and Turkey.

A little earlier, the Foreign Affairs Committee had formally reported the bill. It said in a report to the House that "the very survival of the United States is at stake in the present program to stop Communism from taking Europe over."

Other foreign aid actions: The Senate Foreign Relations Committee recommended \$400,000,000 for aid to 12 million U. S. Of this, \$100,000,000 could be used for military supplies. The Administration had asked \$70,000,000 economic aid for China for 15 months.

The House Appropriations Committee recommended an emergency grant of \$5,000,000 to Austria, France and Italy. This would be for use while the European Recovery Program is being set up.

The way the House operates, the Rules Committee has the job of deciding when a bill is to be considered in the House.
