How CAN we continue to work for peace while we build up armaments and introduce the military system of conscription in America? That question is raised and answered in the letter of the Rev. J. His answer is the eternal Christian answer. We can have peace only through a greater expression of love and only those words and actions which inspire good will and turneth away wrath will serve to reverse the drive toward the use of force in the relations of individuals and nations. It is quite evident, as Mr. Relchard points out, that this purpose will not be served by definance of the new draft law, a course that has been advocated by a group of some 300 rotestant ministers and leader. The resistance program, if carried out, would not add d great deal to the already overloaded store of passion and misunderstanding. law and on the advocates of resistance, creating more pain, grief and anger for uncounted numbers. It cannot but provoke alarm, resentment and indignation among the main body of American citizens who have a broader concept of duty than the rebels against conscription, and who also have a clearer idea of the realities in the present-idsy world.

The advocates of defiance surely must know that they are striking a blow at the authority and the basis of popular govern-ment but obviously are unable to see that the damage they do to this great institu-tion of freedom harms the cause of peace while their protest against conscription does nothing to discourage militarism.

We know that the emergency requiring the draft has grown out of our failure thus far to manifest the goodness, the hope and the faith which would cause governments to develop better policies. We know that the preparedness program will not win us a permanent peace but all our senses tell us that it will create a power balance that will give us time for constructive work toward peace, provided we do not lose heart.

To the generation that is bearing the conscription sacrifice for us, we owe an To the generation that is bearing the conscription sacrifice for us, we owe an expression of profound gratitude, a declaration of absolute faith in the eventual triumph of moral law and a new demonstration of unity. We cannot keep faith with them, or win the peace, by preaching defeatism and advocating disruptive measures in the manner of the 200 bewildered duratt objectors.
