New Chairman Named Dewey Predicts

PHILADELPHIA — (AP) — Gov. Thomas E. Dewey declared today that the "growing" prospects of a Republican victory in November will bring "new hope, unity and a new sense of faith to the world."

The Republican Presidential nominee predicted victory for his ticket, calling Governor Earl Warren of California, a his running mate, in an informal address before the party's national committee.

Dewey and Warren, accompanied by their wives, appeared before the committee after it unanimously ratified the New York Governor's choice of Rep. Hugh Scott, Jr., Philadelphia Congressman, as national party chairman.

A short time later Gov. Dewey pulled out of Philadelphia aboard the special train for his farm at Pawling, N. Y.

Labor Gets Round of Salary Boosts

NEW pay raises for thousands of workers in some of the nation's key industries—coal, steel and electric—were included in new agreements reached yesterday between management and union officials.

The new wage hikes affect a number of the country's 1,600 soft coal workers, 10,000 CIO-United Steelworkers employees at Alcoa, the U.S. Army and 1,800 production and salaried workers of Westinghouse.

Some 17,000 workers in seven plants of the country's National Steel Corp. were granted eleven cent hourly raises today, in line with similar settlements reached with Goodrich & Firestone. In addition, some 8,500 CIO production workers received cost-of-living raises of one cent.

The cost miners will have a 6.5 cent raise effective July 1, when the coal workers' union begins its new contract.

However, the producers who made the contract with Lewis mine 40,000 tons annually, coal men estimated the new agreement will result in a boost in the cost of living to 8.5 per cent.

In Pittsburgh, the Aluminum Co. of America and the CIO-United Steelworkers union agreed to terms providing pay boosts of ten to eighteen cents an hour for 18,000 CIO employees.

The steelducers had asked for a wage hike of thirteen cents an hour and the company had offered a hike of eight per cent or fifteen cents an hour.

The Aluminum company announced, after the settlement, it would increase its basic price for aluminum by one cent per pound.

The first such increase in eleven years will make the price of 99 per cent aluminum pig fifty-two cents a pound and of the large size 99 per cent ingot six cents a pound.

A wage boost of nine to sixteen cents an hour was announced by Westinghouse Electric Corp. for its Pittsburgh to 1,500 production and salaried workers.
