IT is almost like stirring the bones of Hitler, Goering and Goebbels to read in the press that Unity Freeman-Mitford is dead.

The "Aryan" beauty attracted the Fuehrer the year after he came to power in Germany. That was 1934, the year of the blood purge and the Nazi murder of Dollfus in Vienna.

Unity was already smitten with Hitler when the latter was struck by her "perfect Nordic features." She was then eighteen years old.

She lost her head completely, and behaved in a thoroughly irrational manner under his spell. She wrote verse, danced, and joined the British Union of Fascists, organized by Sir Oswald Mosley, who had married her sister, Diana.

The mysterious bullet wound in the head which Unity received in 1939, five days after the outbreak of the second World War, has never been explained. She was in Germany at the time, and when she recovered, she was sent to coast on a route to England, in a special train ordered for her by Hitler.

Unity took little part in the social life of the Scottish Highland community in which she lived with her parents. She walked alone on the Scottish moors, with her hair falling loosely about her shoulders.
