GOP Credit Curb Bill Is Signed

Truman Labels Act Inadequate

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Truman signed into law last night the credit curbs he called only "a tiny fraction of what we need" to fight inflation.

But when the new restrictions on time payment buying and on bank reserves will go into effect remains to be determined.

Some version of the old one-third-down-and-only-15-months-to-pay rule probably will return some time next month.

The Federal Reserve Board said it will lay down all the rules and fix an effective date later this week, probably Friday.

The act will limit the special-inflation bill passed by the anti-inflation bill of the Republican-dominated 80th Congress, earlier this month.

Mr. Truman accompanied his signature of the bill with his prominent least of criticism at the law-makers. And GOP chiefs came right back at him.

The President said the bill represents only a "feeble response" to the demands of the people for strong measures to restrain the rising cost of living.

He said there is a right way and a wrong way to deal with inflation. The right way, he insisted, would have been to give him power to regulate the money supply, to control profit and other wartime controls.

The wrong way, he went on, is to let the price of goods rise to the point of inflation's burden, while special interest reap the benefits of excessive prices.

"We have heard a lot lately from people who advocate this method," the President declared, "but I do not believe that we should fight inflation by putting the average American family through the wringer."

Yesterday's conference was the sixth with Molotov. It was the longest since the negotiations began last three hours and 40 minutes. The Westerners' first meeting with Prime Minister Stalin, which was followed by meeting with Molotov Aug. 6, lasted 12 and a half hours in a drizzling rain last night.

None of the Westerners would comment, as they did the 8th and 10th times.

Six Men Questioned

Police Spread Net For Sex Slayers

ORMOND, Fla.—(AP)—An extensive net was spread by Florida police today for two sex maniacs wanted for questioning in connection with the seaside rape and death of a pretty young office worker and the slaying of her dark-haired companion.

Authorities meanwhile continued to question four white youths and two Negroes about the crime that brought death Saturday night to Mary Hucks, 24-year-old stenographer of East Point, Ga., and Gregory Blount, 23, a student at the University of Kentucky.

The young woman was raped, said police, and their beaten and killed after her escort was shot to death as they lay on a stretcher in the moonlight beach a half-mile from the nearest dwelling.

Committee Is Reported On Trail Of New Ring

Group Seething Over News 'Leak'

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Rep. J. Parnell Thomas (R-NJ) today accused President Truman of trying to "conceal" from the people the facts on Communist spying.

In a statement, Thomas also said the House Un-American Activities Committee has reports of "still another espionage ring" not yet mentioned in Capitol Hill hearings.

As committee chairman, Thomas said his statement would "indicate the committee itself was reported seething with a behind-the-scenes information from the complete Government, the complete story and full facts of this sordid chapter in our history."

Thomas's statement said the committee already has made "ablocking disclosure" of the activities of Communist agents who have been funneling vital information to the Government.

"Why the people have not been informed of these espionage activities can be answered only by President Truman or if congressmen know that there is locked in the files of the executive branch of the Government, the complete story and full facts of this sordid chapter in our history."

"Why the President has seen fit to attempt to conceal this information from the people can only be answered by himself."

President Truman twice has said the committee spy hearings are a "red herring" intended to hide congressional disclosure of our anti-espionage program.

But Thomas said the question of Communist spies has been answered by red herring charges, "even if they came from the President of the United States."

Another ring. Thomas said the committee expects to "bring into full focus" the operations of "still another espionage ring" which he resumed hearings Sept. 7.

He would not go into details but there are reports it will deal with alleged efforts by foreign powers to get American industrial secrets.

Thomas said "the facts should have been before the public many months ago. It is a disgrace that behind the bars."

He said the committee was over the "leak" of information that Alger Hiss, former State Department official, was taken in a closed session yesterday whether Hiss had been ordered to take a lie detector test. Hiss reportedly said he would let the committee know.

Thomas refused absolutely nothing about Hiss.

Thomas refused to discuss any other matter.
