Crackdown Launched By Israel On Terrorists

More than 40 persons were arrested in a group labeling "The Fathead Front" in Hebrew notes slipped under the door of the Jewish settlement offices last night. "The Fathead Front" has not been heard of here previously, and most Jews said they believed it was a front for some existing organization.

The Israeli army slapped a curfew on Jerusalem's Jewish neighborhoods. The shooting took place in the Katamon section of Jerusalem, conquered by the Jews from the Arabs prior to the departure of the British, Bernadotte and the other victim of the shooting, Col. Andre Pierre Serrot, were traveling in a convoy of several UN cars.

Pipeline Support To Be Discussed

Proposals for formal intervention by Charlotte before the Federal Power Commission in support of the Piedmont Natural Gas Corp. \$75,000,000 pipeline project will be considered Wednesday at separate meetings of the Chamber of Commerce directorate and the City Council.

Representatives of the five big powers of the Security Council approved the appointment of Dr. Ralph K. Bunche, an American, as temporary successor to Bernadotte, the UN mediator for Palestine.

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Death Takes Emil Ludwig

ASCONA, Switzerland (AP)—Emil Ludwig, world famous German-born biographer, playwright and political essayist whose books were burned by the Nazis, died at his home here last night. He was 87.

Ludwig had been suffering from a heart ailment for several years. Living quietly in Ascona, he recently completed a book of memoirs. He returned to Switzerland in 1945 after spending the war years in the United States.

Ludwig was known especially for a series of biographies which included Jesus Christ, Abraham Lincoln, and Wilhelm Hohenzollern. His "Life of Napoleon" was adapted to a motion picture in Hollywood in 1932.

He told a Los Angeles advertiser in 1944, "Hate and the arts are not necessarily characteristic of democracy—in fact, the greatest music that has ever been composed was done as under tyranny."

He cited German, Austrian and Russian works. Hisses came from the gathering. Ludwig went on: "I have met and interviewed Hitler (Mussolini), Stalin and Kemal Ataturk) and I have found that each was a man of his time."

He was born in Breslau, Jan. 25, 1881. He moved to Switzerland as a young man. He made no attempt to return to Germany after the rise of Hitler. "The Nazis burned several of his works."

The biographer is survived by his wife and two sons. Funeral services will be held at his home next Thursday.

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Wild Wind And Waves

NEW YORK (AP)—An off-center of the hurricane battered freighter Lesteroid today when four crewmen were swept overboard while others clung to a rock raft clinging to keep up their courage.

The story of the crew's all-night battle against pounding winds, mountainous seas and a wild lashing rain was reported last to The Associated Press by J. T. Andrews, the Lesteroid's 2nd officer.

He and 38 others were rescued from the hurricane-lashed Atlantic today. Another 40 crewmen were saved from the stricken Portuguese schooner as well as the Coast Guard cutter Bibb
