Will Confer On European Defense 'Monty' Faces Busy U. S. Visit

By DON WHITEHEAD and GUY CONYAN WASHINGTON—(AP)—British Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery is expected to arrive in Washington today for an official but highly important round of meetings with America's top-ranking military men.

On the record, the little British warrior with the famous black beret comes to this country as the guest speaker on Nov. 29 before the English-speaking Union in New York.

During his twelve-day trip he will visit with Gen. Eisenhower and his boss in World War II, Gen. Omar N. Bradley, chairman of the joint chiefs of staff, Gen. Joseph L. Collins, Army chief of staff, and other military and government officials.

U. S. Legation Begins Inquiries American Missing in Budapest

OTTAWA—(AP)—The owners and master of the cruise ship Noronic were asked by a Supreme Court of Canada judge today for the Sept. 7 flash fire that took 118 lives as the luxury vessel lay at Toronto dock.

Justice R. L. Kellock, reporting as commissioner in the ordered the master's certificate of Capt. William C. Taylor of Saratoga, Ontario, suspended for a series of measures designed to tighten safety regulations for vessels like the Noronic.

A 30,000-word report was presented to the House of Commons today by Justice Kellock of a brief court judgment, suspending the captain, Frank Williams, for a lack of adequate precautions against fire.

BOTH CENSURED The justice censured the owners and the master, saying they failed to provide proper means of detecting and fighting fire while in dock, and for getting passengers off the ship in the event of fire.
