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### Lawmakers Told Britain Needs Aid

#### Hoffman Before Senate Group

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Administration advised Congress today the proposed \$940,000,000 in new aid to Britain is a "light fit"—the absolute minimum needed.

"Any reduction in it" declared Paul Hoffman, head of the Economic Co-Operation Administration, "would adversely affect conditions in both the United States and Western Europe."

"The whole thing began with a speech by Hoffman," said British Undersecretary of Foreign Affairs, made at a United Nations meeting last week. Hoffman said his country had just about recovered economically.
