HIGHER TRUCK LIMITS

A LREADY passed by the House and now before the State Senate is a bill which would increase the maximum weight of trucks in several categories — two axies, from 26,000 to 30,000 pounds; three axies, from 40,000 to 48,000 pounds; and four or more axies from 50,000 to 64,000 pounds.

The main excuse for the bill given so far is that North Carolina's limits are somewhat lower than those in other states and that interstate operators who route their trucks through North Carolina are unjustly

According to the Winston-Salem Journa thich quotes figures from the Tennesse fotor Transport Association, truck weigh mits are as follows in several states:

Alabama, 56,000 pounds; Mississippi, 52,600 pounds; Georgia, 56,000; Louisiana, 64,000; Arkansas, 55,800; Missouri, 56,000; Illinois, 59,000; South Carolina, 64,550; Virginia, 50,000; Kentucky, 42,000; and Tennessee, 42,000. These figures belie the argument that the N. C. limits are too low.
