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Hottest Legislature Fights To Keep Labor Law

Handling of Strikes Is Sore Spot

Lewis' Strategy Decried by Friends

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate warmed up today for its hottest labor fight over how to handle strikes that could cause national emergencies.

General debate on changing the Taft-Hartley act neared an end, and after speeches by Senators Humphrey (D-Minn.) and Murray (D-Wash.) will come the one-by-one consideration of amendments to the Truman administration's bill for Taft-Hartley repeal.

"National emergency" amendments may be taken up Tuesday and some Senators say the battle will continue the rest of next week.

That also happens to be the week John L. Lewis has set aside for a strike with coal suppliers. His one-day stoppage isn't considered a national emergency, but Lewis says it is.

President Truman has called yesterday at his news conference about the work stoppage Lewis has called for in the Indiana mines.

The President explained Lewis was not a strike but a sort of special emergency strike. Lewis has been heavily fined under this provision in the past. Mr. Truman has called it an emergency.

Lewis' strategy in calling a walk-out during debate on the law's repeal has dismayed some of his former supporters. Government officials plan to delay strikes in vital industries.

A group of Democrats and Republicans in the Senate today said a series of compromise amendments to the Administration bill seemed divided and uncertain over the long term. The bill would provide for a two-year trial period for strikes in vital industries.
