NORFOLK, Va. (AP)—Evidence that the center of the Atlantic hurricane had passed the Diamond Shoals Lightship off the North Carolina coast was contained in a radio dispatch received by Coast Guard Headquarters here at 10:40 A. M. (EST) today.

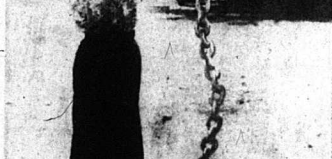

Atlantic Pact Goes Into Effect Truman Signs Proclamation

WASHINGTON (AP)—The twelve-nation Atlantic Pact binding North America and Western Europe in a common defense alliance went into force today.

The historic moment came at 11:42 A. M. (EST) when President Truman signed a proclamation declaring the treaty into effect.

Top-ranking officials of this country and most of the eleven other nations witnessed the signing at a White House ceremony.

Although the alliance was formally signed under the aegis of the Russian aggression, Mr. Truman said in a statement, "no nation need fear the result of the co-operation of the Western powers."

Truman said he did not seek to establish freedom from the treaty, but to ensure that the pact would be a permanent force for stability and peace.

Standing immediately behind Mr. Truman at the signing were the secretary of state, Dean Acheson, and the French ambassador, Henri Bonnet.

He had just deposited his country's "instrument of ratification" by which the French Government formally joined the American Government that it adhered to the pact.

The treaty, signed last April 4, pledges the 12 allies to strike back in the case of an attack against any of them.

PLAN COUNCIL MEETING Already representatives of these twelve nations are at work at the State Department planning for the first meeting of the council of the Atlantic alliance.

That meeting probably will be held in Washington about the middle of next month.

Diplomatic officials also arranged to receive the ratifications of Portugal, Greece, Turkey, and the Netherlands.

The treaty itself provides that it shall come into force when all seven had ratified it and France is the last of the seven to do so.

The total membership of the alliance was raised to 12 in March of this year when five other nations in the Western European Atlantic Pact signed the pact.

These five were Norway, Italy, Denmark, and Greece. The treaty's action clause in which the Western powers state the defensive nature of the pact, provides that if an attack on any one of the members "shall be considered an attack against them all" and then adds:

"The signatories hereby agree that, if such an armed attack occurs, they will, in common with the party or parties so attacked by the attack, individually and jointly, take such action as it deems necessary, including the use of armed force, to meet the common danger and to maintain the security of the north Atlantic area."

"In a bill proposed to meet a portion of global character of the pact, it is not realistic to provide one per cent of the cost of the entire Pacific area, which has a population of more than a billion," Knowland reported.
