WHO'S IN FAVOR OF POLLUTED STREAMS?

NO one, so far as we know, has stood up in the North Carolina General Assembly and spoken in favor of stream pollution. But on every occasion that a bill to curb stream pollution has been presented to that body, it has been voted down.

Some of the legislators, we suppose, thought that a control program would work a hardship on some of the industries of the state which depend their waste into rivers. Under an adequate stream sanitation and conservation program, these industries would be required to process their waste before losing it into rivers and streams.

But there has been argument that stream pollution is now working a hardship on the people of the state.

What's bad about stream pollution?

1. Public water supplies are, in most cases, taken from surface streams. Pollution of these sources can cause sickness and death. The "old swimming hole" also becomes a dangerous spot. Stream pollution is a menace to public health.

2. Water can't be spared for industrial uses. Few industries can operate unless there is an ample supply of good clean water. Industry not only must have a sufficient supply, but in most instances a very rigid demand for water that has a low mineral content.

All bills presented have failed to pass and in 1949 the bill was defeated by eight votes in the House.

Another bill will be presented in January 1961. It is to be hoped that the legislators will give proper attention to the recently published material of the State Stream Sanitation and Conservation Committee which shows the need for action.

It is also to be hoped that the General Assembly will take action to clean up one of our greatest natural resources.

TO CONFFOUND THE KREMLIN

THIS COPY of Collier's Weekly which appeared on the newsstands Friday night suggested that we might confound the Kremlin, which has built a propaganda campaign around American racial segregation, by sending a Negro, Dr. Ralph Bunche, to Moscow as Ambassador to Russia.

Says Collier's:
