## Dangerous Bombing

## President Urged To Call For A-1 Out U.S. Mobilization

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senator Myers of Pennsylvania, assistant Democratic leader in the Senate, carried his fight for immediate "all-out mobilization" to President Truman today.

Myers told White House reporters after a call on President Truman that he urged "complete mobilization" of our industrial scene only in view of the Korean war and threats to other areas.

At the same time some Senate Republicans called on the Administration to say whether the country is headed for all-out war or a pending production control bill.

Chairman Millikin of Senate subcommittee on the economy said a conference of all Senate Republicans discussed what he called a lack of clear information about the country's policies.

**CITES DIFFICULTIES**

Millikin told reporters he and other members of the conference found it difficult to decide what they ought to do about pending production control, tax and appropriations bills "until we have more information on the overall policies of the Administration."

He said he thinks it clear to Congress whether the country is prepared only to mobilize "or whether it is being geared for an "intermediate" preparation.

## Johnson Warns Against Boost In Education Taxes

WRIGHTSVILLE BEACH, N.C.—Charles M. Johnson, chairman of the state education committee, warned today against possible increases in local taxes to provide for public schools.

Now a Charlotte bank executive, Johnson told the State Association of County Commissioners that such an increase would be blamed on them.

"The free wheeling appendix" of the 1948 legislation, he said, conceived the so-called "tax over" which would have increased local taxes to provide for public schools.

"The surplus is gone. If appropriations are made for the next year, increases will face the next General Assembly and after looking complete State support for current needs for public schools, the money and being unable to get it without materially increasing state taxes, the Foundation Plan will be up again."

## Mother And Child Both Doing Well

LONDON — (AP) — A princess was born today to Princess Elizabeth, heiress-presumptive to the throne of the British empire, and her handsome husband, Prince Philip.

The new princess, second child of the royal couple, third in line of succession to the British crown. She follows her chubby 21-month-old brother Prince Charles.

The birth of the baby at Clarence House near Buckingham Palace, the wife of Elizabeth and Philip, placed Elizabeth's sister, vivacious Princess Margaret, into fourth place in the line of succession.

A bulletin issued by the attending physician said the baby came at 10:30 A.M. (10:30 M. G.M.T.) and that "her royal highness and the baby are both doing well."

The baby princess weighed six pounds, an official announcement from the royal household said.

Prince Philip, as he had done with the arrival of Prince Charles, looked the new princess' health in the hospital.

O'Dwyer was born in New York City. He served in the U.S. Army during World War II. He was mayor of New York City from 1945 to 1950.

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## Fighting Along River

## TOKYO—(Wednesday) — (AP) — Red troops with tanks burst out on the Nakdong defense line today below Changnyong and surged to points seven miles east of the river.

They overran segments of the U. S. 24th Infantry Division in bitter fighting that piled up casualties on both sides.

General MacArthur's headquarters in Tokyo early Wednesday announced its usual morning report would be omitted because there had been no change in the South Korean situation. The headquarters war summaries usually are hours behind field dispatches.

The Allied resistance to the Communist advance along the Red was timesable. North Korean prisoners said the schedule called for capture of Taegu, South Korea's emergency capital, on Tuesday, fifth anniversary of V-J Day and of Korea liberation from Japan.

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## Planes Fire On Enemy Troops

TOKYO—(AP)—American fighter planes machine-gunned a group of 30 North Korean Red soldiers on the Nakdong River today and destroyed three of 12 enemy tanks located within 10 miles of the river.

The Air Force flew 200 sorties today despite unfavorable weather. The planes fired 1000 rounds of ammunition.

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## Violent Quake Is Recorded

BOSTON—(AP)—The most violent earthquake in many years has been recorded in the West.

The quake, which lasted for 15 seconds, was recorded by a seismograph station in the town of Harvard, Mass. It was estimated to be of magnitude 4.5.

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
