### PLAYGROUNDS AND POLITICS-III

HAVING outlined the background of the Latia Park community center controversy, and having discussed the departure from good zoning practices inherent in Councilman Coddington's amendment, we pass on today to what we believe is the biggest issue or all—a threat to the community's fast-growing program of public recreation.

The Coddington amendment is designed to block erection of the Latta Park center. It would do so by banning any public building! in a park, Residence I, or Residence II area without the specific approval of the City Council. Hence, it would partially bring the semi-autonomous Park & Recreation Commission under the direct domination of the City Council.

domination of the City Council.

The Park & Recreation Commission was established by act of the General Assembly in 1927. The main reason for giving it an independent status was to keep the public recreation program out of politics. Mr. Coddington's amendment would put it back into politics.

It would do more than that.

1. It would give notice to the members of the Commission—all of whom are putting in long hours of hard work without any compensation except the satisfaction of aerving the people—that the current council no longe ple—that the current Council no longe trusts their Judgment. Since four members of the present Commission were appointed by the present Council, adoption of the Coddington proposal would be an outright repudiation of them.

2. It would negate the findings of an authoritative survey of the City's recreation needs made in 1945. These findings called for a community center in Laita Park. Adoption of the Coddington amendment and subsequent blocking of the Latta Park structure would substitute 'hoss-back' opinion for expert opinion. It would also rerugidate a former Council which, in 1945, accepted the long-range master plan for public recreation which included the Latta Park building.

3. It would nullify, by interspect to exit

3. It would nullify, by inference if not by fact, the expressed will of the voters of Charlotte who approved the \$1,000,000 recreation bond issue last year. For weeks prior to the election extensive publicity was given through every medium to the detailed plan for spending the money. The people did not vote any unrestricted carder blanche authority to the Park & Recreation Commission. They voted for a specific plan. The Commission has endeavored to adhere to that plan Unless Mr. Coddington can produce abundant and convincing evidence that the survey was inaccurate, or that the movement of population has changed the glustion since 1985, arbitrary use of Council authority to ride rough-shod over the Commission and disrupt the City's carefully-drawn recreation plan would be a glicitational flouting of the voters' will.

4. It would make a fundamental change

A. It would make a fundamental change in the Park & Recreation Commission set-p by taking away its authority to erect seeded structures on parks and play-

grounds. There are several ways to administer a public recreation program. In some cities, parks and community centers are operated as regular departments of the City Government. In others, a Park Commissioner appointed by the Mayor and/or the Council has sole authority. But in the overwhelming majority of American cities, parks and playgrounds, like schools, are detached from municipal politics and placed under commissions of non-salaried, public-aprited men, whose continuity of tenure and whose relative isolation from politics enable them to plan and carry out adequate long-range recreation programs. If the Council wants to change the present set-up, it should ask the General Assembly to amend the City Charter, having first ascertained by referendum or by public hearings what the people really want. It should not do so by using the zoning law to punish the Commission.

5. Finally, it would establish a bad prece-

5. Finally, it would establish a bad precedent for future civic projects of all kinds by substituting the will of well-organized, vocal minorities for the will of the great, silent majority. Virtually every public improvement project in Charlotter history—the E. Trade St. underpass, the municipal airport, the Morehead and Graham St. widening projects, the Municipal Stadium, and that controversy-of-all-controversies, Independence Boulevard—stirred militant apposition from affected minorities. Had these minorities been heeded, none of these, and other, projects would ever have been completed. If a small group of citieses can prevent the erection of a building which will be of great benefit to a much larger group of citienes, other minorities will block other community centers and streets and auditoriums. The Council had a taste of what will happen when a sugestion that the center be moved to Freedom Park brought sharp yelps from residents of that area.

In summary, Charlotte's public recrea-

In summary, Charlotte's public recrea-tion program limped along for many years with inadequate money. The system—if it could be called a system—was a diagrace to the Queen City of the Carolinas. Thanks to ABC revenue, a higher recre-ation tax levy, and the \$1.000,000 bond money voted tast year, the system now has a respectable budget. Amazing progress has been made in the past twelve months under the present Commission. The people of Charlotte are at last extitus a decent under the present Commission. The people of Charlotte are at last getting a decent system of public recreation. It would be most unwise to jeopardize this program by subjugating it to the tug-ef-war of Councilmanic politics.


