1. To determine what legislative authority, if any, is needed, an dio recommend the passage of such laws in the 1961 Ceneral Assembly.

2. To study the parking problem from day to day and plan in advance for solution of difficulties before they become acute.

3. To define the limits of congested districts in which, if private enterprise failed to provide facilities after a reason-Tailed to provide facilities after a reasonable time, the City would build the fa-cilities, assessing the cost against nearby landowners in proportion to the benefit to be gained by the landowner. Such fa-cilities would be leased to private opera-tors, or operated by the City in the event no satisfactory bid is received.

4. To work out an amendment to the building code requiring each new building in non-congested areas to provide permanent parking spaces commensurate with the demand the building would

5. To strive for improvement in on-street parking by eliminating unwar-ranted driveways and utilizing loading zones during non-delivery hours.

'NYET' FOR THE 44TH TIME

EVENTS in the United Nations Security Council this week followed the expected course. Before the Council was the U.S. resolution condemning the North Korean suthorities for their continued defiance of the U.N., and calling on all states, U.N. members and non-members. to refrain from aiding or encouraging the North Koreans and to avoid any actions that might spread the Korean war to other areas.

It was a broad resolution, so drawn for
two definite purposes: 49 to stamp the
North Morean Communists as international outlaws, and (2) to put Russia and
Communist China in direct conflict with
the Council's decree should either conthe Council's decree should eith tinue to aid the North Koreans.

On Wednesday the five-weeks-old resolution came up for a vote. Nine countries, including India, voted for it. Yugo-isava abstained. Soviet Ambasador Jakob Mailk their used his veto to defeat the resolution—the 44th time Rusia has employed the veto in the Security Council.

Immediately thereafter, the Council ok up Russia's resolution demanding the thdrawal of all UN forces from Korea.

It was defeated \$ to 1, with Russia casting the only affirmative vote and Seppt and Yugodavia abstaining.

Since Mr. Malik indicated he would continue attending Council-meetings after his term as president expired Aug. 31, it has been clear that Russia would veto any further action by the Council to give new force and meaning to its earlier resolutions. Hence, Wednesday's session was a sort of preliminary to the next big round in the General Assembly later this month. Russia has no veto in the General Assembly later this month. Russia's veto, of course, has no effect on previous actions by the Security Council to lurn back the North Korean invasions.
