

U.S. Agrees To 5-Power Meeting

Would Air Threats To World Peace

Complexity Of Problems Cited

LAKE SUCCESS—(AP)—The United States announced today it was prepared to take part in a five-power meeting on problems a threatening world peace.

This announcement was made in the U. N. Assembly's political committee by John Foster Dulles, Republican policy advisor to the State Dept.

Dulles backed the objectives of a Soviet-United States resolution calling for a five-power conference.

One stumbling block to the whole proposal revolves around whether the Chinese Communists or the Nationalist Government represents China in such big five talks.

NATIONALISTS VS. REDS Russia has insisted that the Chinese Nationalists have no right in the U. N. and their place should be given to the representatives of the Red Chinese regime.

Originally the Soviet-United States proposal called for a meeting between representatives of the United States, Britain, France and Russia leaving out any mention of China.

CITIZEN OTHER MEETINGS Dulles pointed out that the major powers had held thousands of meetings in the past, but had difficulty even in reaching agreement on a single one.

He said the door was open but he said he would not be wrong to create false hope, Dulles said.

Truman Says Issue 'Settled'

Formosa Policy Still In Dark

By ELTON C. FAY... WASHINGTON—(AP)—The aftermath of President Truman's Washington conference with Gen. Douglas MacArthur, although it stirred up considerable heat, shed little light today on what they said about Formosa.

There is no disagreement about Formosa between him and MacArthur, Mr. Truman told his news conference with some specificity today. He said that question was settled five weeks ago.

It appeared obvious that the President was referring to his order more than three weeks ago to MacArthur to withdraw a statement that this country must keep Formosa from falling into unfriendly hands because it is vital to U. S. defense.

Let me tell you something that will be good for your soul. It is that you and I, as citizens and reporters, should understand the ideas of two intellectually honest men.

There is no disagreement between General MacArthur and myself, he went on. Formosa was settled five weeks ago and there has been no change in my position since then when he saw MacArthur last Sunday.

What they did talk about, Mr. Truman said, was a Japanese peace treaty, rehabilitation of Korea and general Far Eastern problems. And when it was over both pointed out the general agreement they had reached.

Rules For Sign-Up Of Reds Listed

Test Of Legality Of Law Expected

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Rules for forcing registration of Communist groups were officially laid down today by the Department of Justice.

Their application appeared certain after a series of hearings and heated legal sessions with actual registration delayed for years.

Under the new anti-subversive law, Communist organizations have until Monday to sign up voluntarily. After that, registration by force is called for.

But this cannot be done until President Truman names the five-member Federal Subversive Activities Control Board set up in the act.

The Communist Party has said it does not intend to register and supply its roll of members, estimated by the FBI to number about 84,000. Communist "action" and "front" groups have shown no interest with the law.

This leaves it up to the attorney general to certify to the board that such-and-such groups registered. The Communist Party failed to do so.

Officials expect the first such group to be the National Lawyers Guild, which has been active against the Communist Party itself.

"Then the party may call for a referendum to contest the definition of Communist groups," he said. "Communist action" group is one dominated by a foreign government.

This question has not been decided by the Supreme Court. If the control board should overrule it and order registration, the organization may appeal to the circuit court here and, if it loses there, to the Supreme Court.

They call for complete disclosure of Communist groups of their sources of income and how it is used. "Action groups" such as the National Lawyers Guild, the names and addresses of all members and those "other than members" who actively participate in the activities of the registrant.

Publications and radio and television programs may be plainly identified as to sponsorship.

Failure to comply with a final order to register may make the organization liable to a fine of \$10,000 or to imprisonment for up to five years or both.

MIAMI, Fla.—(AP)—Hurricane warnings were hoisted along the Florida West Coast at 1:30 P.M. today from Fort Myers to Ocala Key, and storm warnings flew elsewhere over the entire Florida peninsula.

The second hurricane of the week was bearing down on Florida, this one from the Gulf of Mexico. It contained winds of about 80 miles an hour with higher gusts.

A violent hurricane swept from the Atlantic over Miami late Tuesday and early Wednesday with 125-mile winds, it killed 20 persons, injured about 100, inflicted damage of \$15,000,000 to \$20,000,000 and about 20 persons homeless, mostly in the Miami-Port Lauderdale area.

The new storm approaching the state will affect the entire Florida peninsula with gale, with the danger of heavy rain reaching the Tampa Bay area. The weather was expected to reach Tampa-St. Petersburg section tonight.

Former Chicago Mayor Kelly Dead

CHICAGO—(AP)—Former Mayor Edward J. Kelly, 74, Democrat, National Committeeman from Illinois, died today.

He was serving in his suite at the Ambassador East Hotel and died on the way to a doctor's office.

His death was a shock to his friends. He had been active, and during recent weeks had appeared at several Democratic rallies here.

He was Chicago's mayor from 1929 to 1947, longer than any other mayor in the city's history.

He was a member of the leading political forces contributing to the election of the late Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Korean Death March Described By Yanks

TOKYO—(AP)—Thousands of American parachute troops leaped deep into Red Korea to clean up the war today.

They had two missions: To finish the U. N. war and rescue mistreated captive Americans.

General MacArthur himself directed the spectacular aerial assault, the first parachute offensive of the Korean war, from his plane overhead.

The paratroop operation, 23 miles north of the captured Communist capital of Pyongyang, cut the escape of dihardened Red troops still hanging around the north rim of the city.

After flying over the scene, MacArthur said: "I didn't see any opposition. It looks like it was a complete surprise. It looks like we closed the trap. Closing the trap would be the end of all organized resistance. The war is very definitely coming to an end."

The paratroopers, floating down 80 miles south of the Manchurian border, slammed shut the Red escape route north of Pyongyang.

They sought, too, to rescue American prisoners whisked out of liberated Seoul and to seize the fugitive Red army. But, up until a late hour Friday, there was no word whether the Red escape route still was forced to a death march from Seoul—had been rescued.

Some prisoners liberated in American Korea, including Maj. Gen. William F. Dean, commander of the 24th Infantry, disappeared in the battle for Taejon in July, 1950, in the United States Army's 24th Infantry Division. The Red army's General Dean.
