# U.N. Committee Okays 5-Power Peace Talks

LAKE SUCCESS, N.Y. — The U.N. Political Committee today unanimously approved a resolution calling for five power peace negotiations after rebuffing two attempts by Andrei V. Vishinsky to halt recognition for the Chinese Communist regime. It was a rare show of unanimity in the U.N. The Soviet Foreign Minister fought hard for the committee to list specifically the name of the Chinese People's Republic among the great powers but the committee twice voted his motion was not acceptable at this time. This leaves the Nationalist Chinese still in their U.N. seat.

The resolution recommends that the permanent members of the Security Council — France, Britain, China, United States and the Soviet Union — meet and discuss all problems likely to threaten international peace.

**RED VOTES 'YES'**

Vishinsky urged the committee against an "outright" policy but the final count he voted yes. The committee, however, refused to accept his demand for recognition of the Chinese Communist regime. # Henry L. Stimson Dies Suddenly At 83

COLD SPRING HARBOR, N.Y. — Henry L. Stimson, one of the American to lead cabinet officers under four Presidents, died yesterday at his home in Cold Spring Harbor, N.Y., at the age of 83.

Stimson was Secretary of War under Presidents William Howard Taft, Franklin D. Roosevelt and Harry Truman. He was also Hoover's first Secretary of State.

Three months ago Stimson fell and broke his hip, but was making rapid recovery and walking with a cane. He was suffering from a heart ailment. He was struck in the car, was taken to a hospital, and died a few minutes later.

**AGAIN AGGRESSORS**

Stimson was the first leading statesman in any Western country to demand a tough crackdown on the aggressors of the 1930s. His policy failed at the time, but as American Secretary of State, he directed the Army and Air Force to prepare for a new war.

While Stimson's four years as Secretary of State, 1929 to 1933, were distinguished by military and historical events, he ranked him with Lincoln, Roosevelt and Truman as one of the greatest Secretaries of War in American history. He was the only Secretary of War to serve two terms.

He was first called to the office in 1917 by President Taft. At that time the American Army had only 115,000 men and he was asked to lead the German general staff which had been adopted by every army in the world.

He left the post in 1919 and did not take it up again until 1940 — 21 years later. When Franklin D. Roosevelt called him back to duty on the eve of World War II at the age of 72.

# James' Name Withdrawn From Voting Committee Goes Against Scott Pick

RALEIGH — (AP) — The State Democratic executive committee today nominated Jeff D. Johnson of Clinton as its candidate for associate justice of the State Supreme Court in the Nov. 7 general election.

Johnson was the nomination withdrawn by Gov. Scott, who had appointed James to the Supreme Court vacancy left by the death of Associate Justice J. P. Seavey to serve until the Nov. 7 election returns are completed.

The governor had expressed the hope that the committee would give the nomination to James, 37-year-old Winston-Salem lawyer.

Johnson, a former Superior Court Judge who managed the unsuccessful primary campaign of Sen. Frank Graham, had been mentioned as a leading contender for the court since James' death.

**WIDE BACKING**

His nomination by the committee was assured when his own personal supporters were joined by opponents of Governor Scott. Among the candidates, including Attorney General B. B. Hargrove and Sen. Frank Graham, were many who had been in the State Senate in 1946, he was one of an estimated 2,000-man army that fought in every part of the world.

A native of Clinton, Johnson graduated from Duke University and taught school in Winston-Salem for a year. He then opened his law office in Clinton.
