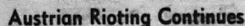


## SOUTH CAROLINIAN LIBERATED IN KOREA

**LAKE SUCCESS, (AP)**—The United Nations grove to vote on a showdown vote on opposing east and west Korean peace plans today.

Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei V. Vishinskiy takes the floor in the assembly's 60-nation plenary session today to present his final plea for acceptance of his plan. British Minister of State Kenneth Younger is expected to follow with a similar appeal for support of the American-backed proposal submitted by Britain and seven other nations.

Younger is expected to take the floor in the day despite last-minute statements by Yugoslavia and India yesterday to shunt both plans to a subsequent session.

**WESTERN VICTORY SEEN**

An overwhelming victory was forecast for the West's peace plan, which calls for a cease-fire in China's D. T. F. Taining island as prominent American officials predicted a "dependance, unity and rehabilitation" of the island.

Reaction to yesterday's vote will be a key factor in the final decision.

**TO AID GUERRILLAS**

It is not surprising that increasing speculation here that the Russians and Red Chinese will eventually be forced to withdraw and convert their country into another Greece or Indo-China. That would mean the end of the long-standing real peace to the peninsula and a prolonged drain on American military resources.

However, the growing power of South Korean forces, with American training and supplies and support, has been widely noted, as well as in other ways by the United Nations, probably would make it impossible for the Communists to stay in large numbers to remain in the fight indefinitely.

It is not surprising, therefore, to see in official here as several months ago, that the Communists, armed by the United Nations.

The Korean Reds have continued to fight fiercely and may well maintain their control of the mountainous areas, but the control of key points and major transportation routes, which are essential to the Reds, will require far more operations.

Another point bearing on the issue is the development of the Red line in the North. The Reds have said they would not sit or wait for a friendly country to invade, but they have made an evaded reference to the crossing of the 38th Parallel by United Nations forces.

Authorities here still do not believe that the Chinese intend to invade North Korea, but do say that they might do so if the Communists in North Korea should be forced to withdraw.

The total effect of the Chinese proposal as seen here has been that the United Nations will not sides avoid participation. It is generally seen the hope was that the Chinese would be forced to withdraw and the Russians would accept the Communist military decision.

support to North Korean guerrillas. Russia's position meanwhile has been developed in the United Nations.
