U. S. Seeking Showdown With Chinese Leads In UN

Resolution Put Before World Body Peiping Won't Withdraw Troops

LAKE SUCCESS—(AP)—The United States wants the UN Security Council to put on record the "consciousness of the people of the world" in a showdown today on American charges of Chinese Communist aggression in Korea.

Chief U. S. Delegate Warren B. Austin, in his speech before the council yesterday, forecast a probable Soviet veto of a six-power resolution demanding withdrawal of Chinese troops from Korea.

Without much prospect they can act effectively themselves, Senator asked Secretary of Defense Marshall — or some top aide, if he can't come to tell the Armed Services Committee about the military outlook as a result of Chinese Communist pressure.

Undersecretary of Defense Robert Lovett and General Alfred M. Gruentzer, assistant chief of staff of the Army, met with the committee and gave its members battle front details.

Penetration signs brought up huge questions about the danger of a new world war is greater now than it was two weeks ago, but he still is hopeful it can be avoided.

Government To Consult Allies

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Chinese Communist offensive in Korea today confronted the United States with the gravest decisions since the end of World War II, Administration officials said today.

The Government's present intention, they said, is to deal with the situation in the United States and through intensive consultation with Britain, France and other U. N. members.

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2 U. S. Divisions Flee Across River

SEOUL—(AP)—Two American divisions escaped south across the icy Chongchon River in north west Korea today but Chinese Reds swarming through a wide gap threatened to trap a big Allied force.

The Chinese offensive mass of more than 200,000 men was reported using tanks for the first time.

A spokesman at advanced U. S. Eighth Army headquarters said one Communist platoon had cut within 30 miles of the former Red Korean capital of Pyongyang.

He said the Red force was near Singchang northeast of the capital but did not disclose its size.

At least three other Red Chinese columns were reported rolling down through the Taichon gap in wide sweeps against the Allies' exposed flanks.

This was where Communist attacks earlier had crumpled three Communist divisions.

Another Chinese force was reported attacking the first time on the extreme left flank, but a spokesman did not give the location.

Chinese breakthrough in force to the Yellow Sea would set off heavy fighting in the Taichon gap, a force fighting for its life in the northwest.
