Hence, in one respect, the argument over Federal power, irrigation, flood control, confervation, and reclamation projects is academic. The Congress has already set the national policy, and shows no signs of reversing itself. As long as that policy maintains, it certainly makes sense to strive for the maximum possible co-ordination, from the survey stage to appropriations, to achieve the long-range objective of water resource conservation.

The Congress will doubtless find itself more amenable to further Federal power projects under pressure of the current emergency. The first volume of the Commission's report, and the two additional volumes due next month, should be of great help to Congress.
