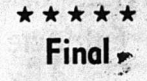

**Asia Expert Called Top Soviet Spy**

**Promises Full Reply To Senator**

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Open Lattimore pleaded today as "pure moonshine" Senator McCarthy's charges that he is Russia's top spy in the United States.

Lattimore, an expert on Far Eastern affairs, called the Associated Press from Afghanistan where he is on a United Nations mission.

He said he would be home in a few days and promised to answer the charges in detail.

McCarthy, Wisconsin Republican, said he has said privately to newsmen as "the man connected with the State Department whom I consider the top Russian espionage agent in this country." This information was made public last night in a radio broadcast.

McCarthy declined to comment on Lattimore's reply. He told a reporter he might have something to say "on the general situation later."

Lattimore, replying to a request for comment from the Associated Press last Friday, said in his cable:

"McCarthy's oft repeated ramblings are pure moonshine. Delighted by his whole case rests on me as this means he will fall flat on face soon. Exactly that he has said don't repeat unknown here so cannot reply in detail but will be home in five days and will contact you through my representative."

**Soviet Quits U. N. Rights Commission**

**Reds Lash At Mrs. Roosevelt**

**LAKE SUCCESS**—(AP)—Russia walked out of the United Nations Human Rights Commission today after making a harsh verbal attack on the commission chairman, Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt.

The Soviet delegate, Semyon K. Tharapkin, accused Mrs. Roosevelt of "insulting what he called the efforts of the United States to use the United Nations for its own political purposes."

Mrs. Roosevelt banged the gavel repeatedly and said angrily: "We are now proceeding to the election of officers. We are not interested in any more propaganda speeches."

Tharapkin was permitted to finish and walked out before the election of officers. We are not interested in any more propaganda speeches.

Mrs. Roosevelt called the Soviet action "a gross insult to the United States and the United Nations." She said she would not receive the Soviet delegate for her fifth term as chairman by acclamation. P. C. Chang, delegate of the Chinese Nationalist Government, was elected first vice chairman.

Mrs. Roosevelt made his attack on Mrs. Roosevelt and the United States after the eight-member commission upheld her ruling that a Soviet resolution to oust the Chinese Nationalist delegation from the United Nations was not in order.

The vote was 12 to 0 for Mrs. Roosevelt's ruling. Russia and Yugoslavia voting the negative votes, Tharapkin concluded his speech and walked out before the election of officers. The Soviet Union, which had been invited to join the commission, was not represented.

This was the sixteenth U. N. organizing session since the United Nations began in 1945.

**Baltimore Communist Foe, Pearson Says**

**Dennis Loses Appeal To High Court**

**Party Secretary Guilty Of Contempt**

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Supreme Court today upheld the contempt-of-Congress conviction of Eugene Dennis, general secretary of the American Communist Party.

Dennis appealed to the high tribunal with the contention that a Communist official could not get a fair trial before a jury which included government witnesses.

The trial before the House Seven Federal workers were on the jury which convicted Dennis, Justice Minton delivered today's 5-2 decision.

Justices Black and Frankfurter were dissenting. Justices Clark and Douglas took no part. On the majority side with Minton were Chief Justice Vinson and Justices Jackson, Reed, Burton.

The contempt of Congress conviction was based on a charge that Dennis willfully disobeyed a subpoena to appear before the House Un-American Activities Committee on April 9, 1947.

The case is separate from the 1949 New York case in which Dennis was sentenced to a year in prison and fined \$1,000.

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**PROF. LATTIMORE**

Eleanor Holgate, was engaged in newspaper work and business in Shanghai and Tientsin for many years before he came to the U. S. in the Far East.
