Group In First Public Statement

An auditorium seating 2,000 to 3,000 and an indoor sports coliseum of 10,000 seats were recommended for Charlotte today by the City Council's special Auditorium Committee.

In its first public statement since it began studying Charlotte's auditorium needs last fall, the committee said it was continuing its search for a suitable location.

It is seeking property that will be well situated and adequate for large parking spaces as well as for the auditorium and coliseum buildings, the committee said. Both buildings will be put on one tract of land.

The first recommendations of the group were made at a public hearing to inform the public of progress in its study.

It was led by Ed Ovens, the Council's committee said. There seems to be no difference of opinion that such a suitable site is first, an auditorium.

PARIS — (AP) — United Nations Secretary-General Trygve Lie announced today he will fly to Moscow May 10 to try to persuade Russia to agree to a meeting of world leaders with the Security Council aimed at ending the cold war and averting a global catastrophe.

In an obvious reference to former President Herbert C. Hoover's proposal to reorganize the U. N. without Russia and her satellites, Lie denounced any attempt to split the world permanently into two camps. Announcing his plans to a news conference here, Lie said: "When the United Nations was established in San Francisco, it was created as an organization for the entire world. Now it is proposed to split the world permanently into two camps."

That road would widen existing divisions, he said, create new ones, perpetuate and accelerate the arms race, make economic warfare a permanent condition, condemn all the poor and hungry in many parts of the world to remaining poor and hungry, bring the propaganda war and its depths of intellectual and moral degradation, and destroy the chance for a new world order of atomic energy.

Veteran New Dealer Defeated Pepper Loses Race To Smathers

By ASSOCIATED PRESS St. Petersburg, Fla., (AP) — A Democrat in an election at Democrats out-numbered Republicans by better than 13 to 1. His Republican opponent in November will be John A. Booth of Miami.

National interest in the Florida primary far overtook that in the primary held in three other states yesterday — Ohio, Alabama and Indiana. In Ohio, Joseph T. Ferguson, state auditor, claimed victory in a seven-candidate race for the Democratic Senatorial nomination to oppose Republican Sen. Taft next fall.

Pepper conceded at 12:11 A. M. While the issues were clearly drawn in the intra-party Florida race, national political leaders differed as to the extent of its significance.

Democrats had said in advance that it was more of a personal fight with the result having no bearing on national fate. They also figured the Communist issue raised by Smathers would becloud the picture, and recalled the pepper vigorously opposed Mr. Truman's nomination in 1948.

Republicans had predicted a Pepper defeat would mark a "trend" against the Truman program, and that's just what GOP National Chairman Guy Obispo labeled the outcome. In a statement issued shortly after Pepper gave up, Obispo said:

"The Florida primary confirms the trend. Voters everywhere are turning toward the principles for which the Republican Party has been fighting, and against the Socialism of President Truman's Fair Deal."

"Will the President recognize this change from his own party in Florida? Or on his non-political trip, will he continue to talk about red-baiting, socialized medicine, and the Brannan plan?"

Pepper was supported by the CIO, A.P.C. and railroad brotherhoods. He campaigned as an advocate of more Federal financing, broader public services, increased age assistance, and a national health program. Sen. Taft was in deficit spending, a balanced budget, more free enterprise. He opposed what he called "socialism."
