NORTH CAROLINA'S Carl Durham is vice-chairman of the joint Congressional Atomic Energy Committee. He is also very cool-headed, realistic, and outspoken. When he talks about the white-hot international situation, as he did before the Jaycees in High Point the other day, he's worth listening to.

Mr. Durham said something that a good nany Americans, in high places and low, have been thinking for a long time, but carcely dared put into words.

"T think that in the days to come, the pattern will be sufficiently clear to tell us whether or no Russia is trying to defeat us through her satellite nations." If it becomes clear beyond all doubt that this is the Russian policy, then I can war with Russia, in which event, we must pick the time and place.

Mr. Durham is fully aware that Americans, up to this point at least, have never cottoned to the idea that the U. 8. should deliberately start a war. There are two reasons they have felt that way: (1) they don't want to be considered as aggressors; (2) it requires the abandoment of all hops for peace, and Americans abandon that hope with greatest reluctance.

## ROAD THROUGH WONDERLAND

THE opening of a new section of the Blue Ridge Parkway from Asheville to the Mt. Mitchell turn-off last Saturto the sat. Sattenell turn-off last Satur-day was properly an occasion for rejoicing in the Land of the Sky. And the Asheville Citizen-Times, displaying its customary enthusiasm for Western North Carolina progress, devoted columns of space in its Sunday edition to stories and pictures her-aiding the event

If we, down in the bustling Piedmont may be permitted to have our small say, we would like to join in the general celeration. For the Parkway—one of the few Juxury Federal projects we approve—is radually becoming one of the state's finest assets in building up what is almost assets in building up what is almost assets in building up what is almost asset in building to the present Southern terminus, asheville he Parkway is a thing of breath-taking beauty. With the exception of a loop around Roanoke and a short stretch west of Lynchburg, the road is open for travel from Shenandoah to the North Carolina state line, a distance of about 215 miles. In the North Carolina section from the State line to Asheville, the only missing link is from Deep Gap to a point near Linville. Eventually the Parkway will be completed from Asheville South and West Cardat San Pagas Nasional Procest to the gh the Pisgah National Forest to the Smoky Mountains National Park.

At present the only part of this stretch open to travel is a five-mile "preview" link with Wagon Road Gap east of Waynesville.

A miracle of engineering, the moun-tain crest road skims along through un-spolled virgin territory, offering on either side some of the most magnificent moun-tain and visiley scenery anywhere in the world. The Parkway, the property of the propie of the United States, has not been commercialized, but the heavy travel in commercialized, but the heavy travel in recent years has prompted the develop-ment of fine tourist facilities at many points a mile or so off the Parkway.
