That objection is met by the Center's exponents with the point that any genuine cure of alcoholism depends on the patient's willingness to be cured. If they do not honestly want to rid themselves of their disease, no amount of steel bars will keep them from mahogany bars.

Indeed, we think it is the voluntary aspect of the Center that makes its future bright. For instance, there will be no mis-treatment of patients, as has been the case in some of our semi-penal 'hospitals', for a mistreated patient can leave and spread the story immediately. The doors without locks and grounds without fences will surely be more conductive to readjustment than the cell-like existence to which most alcoholies have been subjected in the past.

The Center is new and, admittedly an experiment. Bome failures must be expected but they will not be so numerous, we feel, as the failures produced by earlier systems for lack of system: which ranged from total neglect and riducile to harsh, punitive "cures" which, as often as not. made the patient want nothing more than a good stiff drink.

It looks as if the day that the workers of the States have so long awaited—the day of sensible, sensitive treatment for alcoholics—is here.
