BOLD ATTACK ON PARKING PROBLEM

HAVING emphasized the need for off-street parking facilities in Charlotte at every opportunity during the past five years, the News awaited the report of the Mayor's special Parking Study Committee...

3. To define the limits of congested districts in which, if private enterprise failed to provide facilities after a reasonable time, the City would build the facilities...

4. To work out an amendment to the building code requiring each new building in non-congested areas to provide permanent parking spaces commensurate with the demand the building would create...

5. To strive for improvement in on-street parking by eliminating unwarranted driveways and utilizing loading zones during non-delivery hours.

1. To determine by legislative authority, if any, is needed, an order recommending the passage of such laws in the 1951 General Assembly.

2. To study the parking problem from the city and county angles and to formulate a plan of action to meet the problem of difficulties before they become acute.

'NYET' FOR THE 44TH TIME

EVENTS in the United Nations Security Council this week followed the expected course. Before the Council on U. S. resolution condemning the North Korean authorities for their continued defiance of the U. N., and calling on all states, U. N. members and non-members, to refrain from aiding or encouraging the North Koreans...

It was a broad resolution, so drawn for two definite purposes: (1) to stamp the North Korean Communists as International outlaws, and (2) to put Russia and Communist China in direct conflict with the Council's decree should either continue to aid the North Koreans.

On Wednesday the five-week-old resolution came up for a vote. Nine countries, including India, voted for it. Yugoslavia abstained. Soviet Ambassador Jakob Malik used his veto to defeat the resolution on the 44th time. Russia has employed the veto in the Security Council.

PRESIDENTIAL P's AND Q's

It is no wonder, then, that Harry Truman needs, as reported in Drew Pearson's column, a session of psychotherapy every now and then. The White House physician probably has been called upon to listen to a good deal of talking by Truman after this week's Marine propaganda business.

THE GIFTED CHILD

THERE is a North Carolina educator that our schools fail to offer a special training to our exceptionally gifted and talented children and likely enough he will answer: "We have more pressing problems."

That is true, of course. For instance, adequate educational provisions are not being made for the gifted child in the classroom. We do not have enough classroom space; qualified teachers for both races are in short supply; handicapped children are tragically neglected.

But, as a speaker at the American Psychological Association's recent meeting in New York said, these gifted and talented youngsters are the nation's greatest resource. Prof. Paul Twitty of Northwestern University pointed out:

"Although a small number of administrators and some teachers recognize the existence of the gifted child, the prevailing opinion is to challenge these pupils, many of whom fall far below the level of the gifted person in social welfare."

That "failure to understand" crops up in both elementary and high school, and it means that a lot of potential leaders are left undeveloped. What can be done within the limitations of a budget and taking into account the many problems of the gifted youngster?
