## Finnegan Asked To Quit, Snyder Says

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of the Treasury Snyder testified today he asked James P. Finnegan to resign as St. Louis internal revenue collector. He said he made the request as late as August 1950, two months before Finnegan asserted he was asked to "stay on" by President Truman.

Snyder's testimony thus appeared to dispute that of Finnegan, who finally quit under fire last April after his office came under investigation by a St. Louis grand jury and Congress.

Snyder testified before a House Ways & Means Subcommittee investigating reports of corruption and irregularities in the nation's tax collection service.

## Billy Rose, Wife Reported Apart, Planning Divorce

NEW YORK (AP)—Millionaire showman Billy Rose and his wife, Eleanor, have separated and a divorce is in the offing, the New York Journal-American said today.

The couple had not been seen together in the usual Broadway night spots since Joyce Mathews, former wife of TV comic Milton Berle, attempted suicide July 15 in Rose's penthouse apartment.

Rose and Miss Holm, beautiful former Olympic swimming star, were unavailable for comment.

"The separation is permanent," the newspaper said.

It said also that the marriage "was known—definitely—to be headed for divorce."

Rose and his wife have been living apart only the last few days, the story said.

The final blow came suddenly and unexpectedly.

Which radiates more of the sun's heat, a clear or an overcast sky? You might be surprised to know there's not much difference.

If the sky is completely overcast by a uniform cloud layer, just dense enough to blot out the sun, the radiated heat will be slightly greater than from a clear sky. But in either case, the radiated heat is only a fraction of the amount that reaches the earth directly from the sun.

The direct sunlight is greatest at noon, when it's about thirteen times as strong as the radiated heat from a clear sky.

## Secretary Clears Jessup Acheson Supported Ending China Aid

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Acheson said today he supported at a 1949 White House conference a proposal that American military aid to the Chinese Nationalists be suspended.

The conference, held Feb. 5, 1949, has figured in Senate controversy over President Truman's nomination of Ambassador Philip Jessup to be a U. S. delegate to the United Nations.

Harold Stassen has said the late Senator Arthur Vandenberg (R-Mich.) once told him that Acheson and Jessup backed at the conference an end to aid to the Chinese Nationalists.

## Cairo Rioters Demonstrate Against West

CAIRO, Egypt (AP)—Shouting rioters attacked offices and trucks of Western businesses in Cairo today and tried to burn them in a demonstration of support for the government's move to cut off British forces from the Suez Canal area and the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan.

Two trucks, one carrying Coca Cola and the other Pepsi-Cola, were overturned by a crowd which tried to set them afire. Several other soft drink trucks were attacked.
