THE AIRPORT MUST BE ENLARGED

PROJECTED extension of one of the Argunzays of Charlotte's Municipal simport has pileced the County Commissioners in a dilemma that faces every governing body at one time or another and from which there is no simple, easy escape.

No law has ever heart placed without hurring or inconveniencing someone. No new street has ever been cut through developed property, no school building erected, no six-port built or enlarged without causing some constelnation or dismay among nearby residents.

In the case at point, one of the oldest communities in the nation, Mecklenburg's famed Steele Creek, is affected. The big planes that use the Charlotte airport in ever-increasing numbers are already disturbing the residents of Steele Creek. And the people are not only right, but they are also within their rights, when they arreps concern over their rights, when they express concern over the probability of even greater disturbance in the future.

in the future.

Even so, there is but one choice the Commissioners can make. That is to approve the routine petition to close a small section of Dizic Road and permit the extension of the runway. To do otherwise would be unthinkable.

A full presentation of the case for favor-able action, complete with statistical docu-mentation, would require more space than these columns offer. Here are some of the main points:

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1. There has been too much emphasis in the public discussion on the probable use of jets by an Air National Guard squadron. It is a factor, to be sure, and all other things being equal, Charlotte and Mecklenburg County owe it to the nation to provide a place for Air National Guardsmen to stay in training for emergency if, as it appears, Guard officials need a training base here. But the fact is that Charlotte's sirport needs longer runways now, not for military jets but for the bigger commercial propeller planes operating today. And the era of commercial jet airplanes, which need long runways because of their high landing speed, is just over the horizon.

2. It is useless to suggest that a new air-port sheuld be built somewhere else in Mecklenburg County. Already there is a total investment at the present site running into the millions, and another million dollar im-provement program is under way at present. It would be an extravagant waste of public money to abandon the present airport and build a new one. Furthermore, the Com-missioners would quickly find new opposition from the residents of the alternate site as

vigorous, or even more vigorous, than that they have heard.

3. Charlytte has achieved an eminent position in modern commercial aviation. The City fought hard in the postwar era to get new lines and new routes, and it was notably day branching out in all direction Passenger and freight traffic are booming. It is one of the major air centers of the flation, and simply must keep its facilities up to date if it hopes to remain a major center.

4. The Commissioners should remember, also, that interest in this project is not limited to the residents of Steel Creek alone. The Commissioners represent the people of Charlotte as well as the people of the County area.
