KEY'S BACKERS A WAIT WORD

WASHINGTON (AP)—Although Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's return to Washington may bring no public political announcement, Republicans plugging for him to become their party's 1952 Presidential candidate apparently hoped today to gain some private assurances of his possible return.

Bomb Blasts Printing Plant In Argentina

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP)—A strong bomb blast today damaged a printing plant owned by Mrs. Eva Peron's book, "The Reason for My Life."

It was not immediately known whether the explosion caused any casualties.

Mrs. Peron is the wife of the Argentine president, Juan D. Peron, who is campaigning for a new six-year term in the Nov. 11 election.

The bomb burst at the corner of Cangallo and San Martin streets, breaking windows in the Casa Foyers printing plant. Other nearby buildings also were damaged.

Other violent incidents have accompanied the election campaign. A Peron follower was killed and the Communist candidate for president, Rodolfo Ghidella, was shot in the lung this week at Parana, 200 miles north of Buenos Aires, when bomb blasts and a Communist mob broke up a Communist meeting Ghidella was addressing.

Several weeks earlier, Peron charged that some officers in the army were plotting a revolt. Several were arrested.

Peron stepped temporarily from the presidency this week in an effort to show he is not influencing the outcome of the election.

He is about to start a campaign tour through three provinces which he has named after his late, hand-picked Peronist candidates for Congressional seats and provincial offices.

King has a couple of weeks, he'll stay in El Paso to "brush up on his Egyptian dancing and the mambo (a dance)." King told reporters.

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Snow Rain & Cold March Across U.S.

WESTERN WINDS of between 35 and 50 mph in hour.

Southeastern Maine was doused by 2.8 inches of rain in 12 hours. Wind gusts ranging up to 30 miles per hour were reported in that section.

The mercury dipped to levels below freezing in 25 states between the Western mountains and New York State. Record low readings for the date were reported in many areas. Temperatures ranged down to -3 at Park Falls, Wis.

The freezing spell stretched across the north and extended into Texas, Georgia and Alabama.

SNOW IN N. Y.—A record eight inches of snow fell in the Buffalo, N. Y. area. The fall was expected to pile up to ten inches. Central New York about four inches of snow and it continued to fall.

The snow reached a three inch depth in Pittsburgh and reached up to four and a half inches in Western Pennsylvania.

Storm warnings were hoisted on the east coast from Block Island, at the northern tip of Long Island Sound, to Cape Hatteras, N. C.

Weathercasters predicted heavy snow in the Northeast and Midwest.
